Course Overview

This course introduces students to 35mm cameras, teaches them to load 35mm film, expose, unload and develop black and white negatives. Students hand-print their work in a black and white "wet" darkroom. Students will focus on visualization, self-expression, and increasing their skills for observation.

Essential Questions

Concepts providing focus for student learning

- What is Art?
- How do I recognize a "good" photograph?
- What elements are needed to create an aesthetically pleasing photograph?
- How does an artist work differently when seeing the world through black and white?
- How does the physics of light influence this art form?
- How can one capture the observation in print?
- What are some roles of a photographer?
- How can I best use the equipment and the elements and principles of design to visually depict my ideas?
- How can I affect society with my photography?

Proficiency Statements

Upon completion of course, students will be able to:

- Understand the workings of the 35 mm camera, including shutter, aperture, film speed, and focus.
- Demonstrate the ability to expose, develop, and print 35 mm black and white film, showing proper and safe use of the darkroom equipment.
- Refine observation skills through the medium of photography.
- Demonstrate discipline in safe use of equipment, organization of time, and care of materials.
- Learn basic photo terms and vocabulary.
- Learn to critique a photograph using the following as a guide: value, clarity, technical execution,

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presentation, composition, and aesthetics. The principles of art and elements of design may also be attributes of photographic critique. This will be done both orally and written.

- Keep a portfolio that will consist of negatives, prints, instructor and self evaluations and reflections, and exposure data for original shooting (camera) settings and printing (enlarger) settings.
- Research a famous photographer and give an oral presentation with visuals to the class.
- Analyze how technical and aesthetic elements contribute to the ideas, emotions and overall impact communicated through photography.
- Analyze photography comparing/contrasting it to another work from a different time or culture.
- Describe and explain how the characteristics of a society or culture influence photography.
- Analyze photographs from the media to look for specific elements and principles and how the photographer used them in the work.
