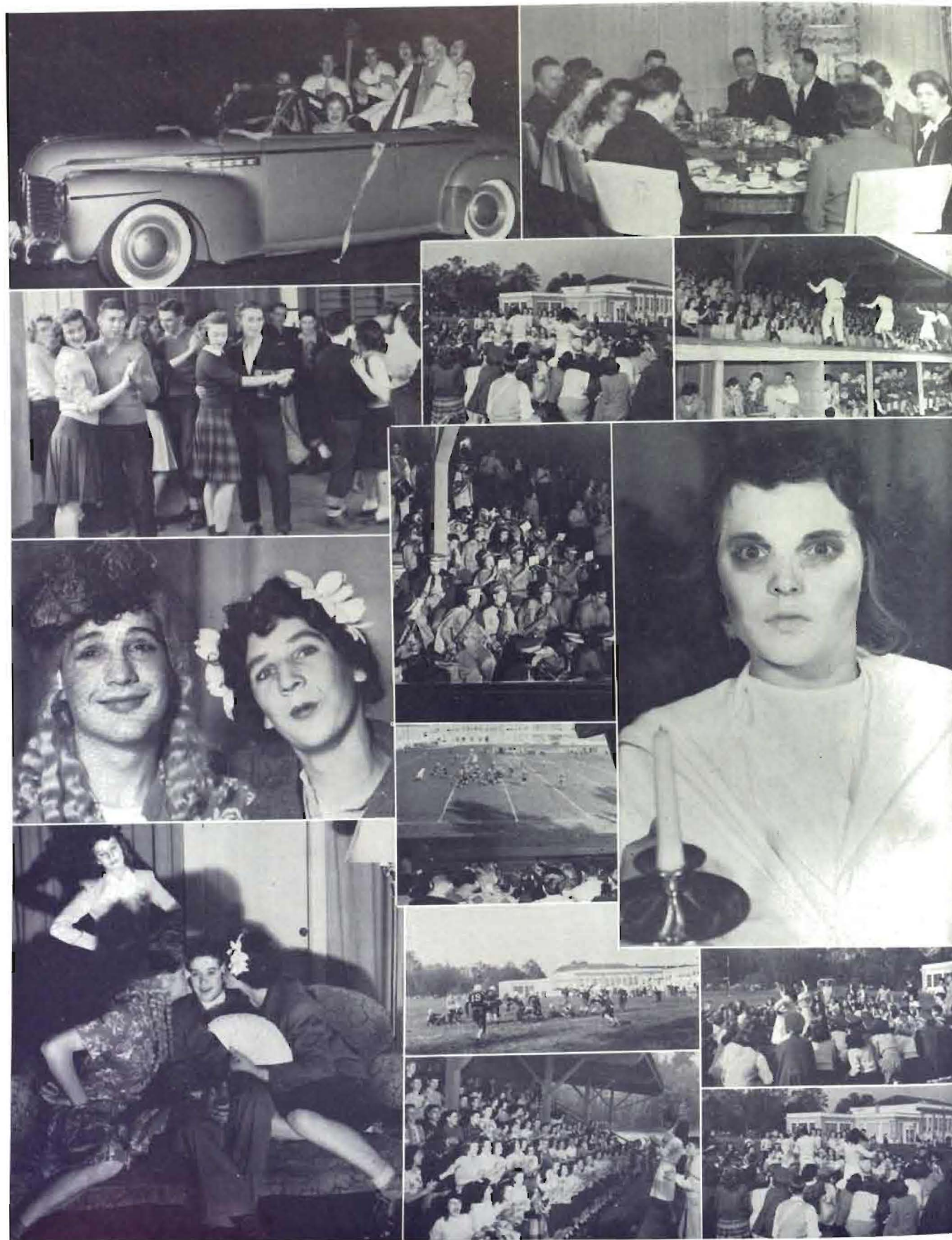


Captain Ralph Matile won additional high honors for himself and for West Linn High, when he was voted one of
