- 3. Why did Richard Cory go home one calm summer night and "put a bullet in his head" (16)?

- 1. Identify 5 words in the poem that Robinson uses to characterize Richard Cory, and for each, explain what additional meaning(s) that word has in the poem.
- 2. Why do you think the people in the poem "cursed the bread" (14)?
- 3. What is meant by the statement "he glittered when he walked" (8)?
- 4. Where does Richard Cory live? Why is this significant?
- 5. What do you think the people in the poem are likely to say after finding out that Richard Cory was dead? Why?
