

2019 West Linn-Wilsonville Bond Summit

February 23, 2019



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Introduction and Background



In response to recommendations the Long Range Planning Committee made to the School Board in January, the West Linn-Wilsonville School District held a Community Bond Summit on February 23, inviting more than 200 community members to participate in a day of bond-related activities. The purpose of the Bond Summit is to educate the community and also provide feedback and input for the School Board to consider.

Bond Summit participants consisted of parent and teacher representation from all 16 WLWV schools, including Three Rivers Charter School, as well as West Linn-Wilsonville students, administrators, and classified staff. Community members in attendance also consisted of School Board Members, both West Linn and Wilsonville Mayors, West Linn and Wilsonville City Council Members, West Linn and Wilsonville City Staffs, representatives from the Education Foundation and Music and Arts Partners, local senators and state representatives, First Student Bus Company, West Linn-Wilsonville Long Range Planning Committee and Budget Committee members, district operations staff, local librarians, and many more.

While Board and Long Range Planning Committee discussions have been ongoing for a number of months, the Bond Summit signals the beginning of a [potential Capital Bond](#). The Board will continue to solicit community input in coming months through polling and surveying, with the possibility of a Capital Bond going on the November Clackamas County Election Ballot. On behalf of the School Board, and District, thank you to every community member who participated in the 2019 Bond Summit.

Table “Dot” Exercise Results



Bond Summit attendees were given the opportunity to lend support to the [seven listed projects](#), as well as present new project ideas if they felt there’s something else bond dollars should go toward. Every attendee received eight “sticky dots” to place on the seven projects, which were spread out throughout the room on large poster boards. Attendees could distribute their dots however they felt was appropriate, sometimes placing multiple on one project and none on others. The activity’s purpose was to provide additional information for the district and School Board. The dot totals are listed below:

Framework for Excellence

Bond Summit participants were divided into 26 separate table groups, participating in a variety of activities throughout the day. The first activity, titled Framework for Excellence, familiarized participants with the district’s Long Range Plan. The Long Range Plan outlines 14 programs and



initiatives that build resilient schools and significantly enhance the overall quality of education offered to the students of West Linn-Wilsonville. The purpose of the Framework for Excellence activity was for participants to connect those initiatives and programs to facility needs in the district. **The following is written feedback from table groups and individual participants.**

Notes from Table 19

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- City level — connecting plan for future business development 20 years out and predicting what skills our community members may need to fill these jobs. How do you plan for jobs we don't know will exist? Learning how to learn becomes more critical. Maker space.
- Programs where kids can explore CTE experiences and program. Connect learning options with career. Electrical, etc.
- Kids want more elective classes that help them try out things related to careers – college majors such as communications and technology.
- More career exploration – lower grades.
- How might we extend the school day in a more open-ended format – enrichment and courses are not student-directed. (K-3): Deeper look at who participates and changing nature of programming.
- More program partnerships
- Library needs to be fully staffed to achieve full potential of spaces/resources.
- Technology – learn with technology but not the only thing/tool. Emphasize critical thinking skills be the focus.
- Wilsonville does not have a visual/performing arts center and there's a need. Performing arts builds skills on presenting ourselves socially and functionally. Have led to great academic outcomes with students who are involved in the arts. Performing arts center at WHS currently is too small.

Other comments:

- Schools as health centers for the community – mental health, medical health, access to state/federal county services.

Notes from Table 15

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Dual Language Program – opportunities engage in the community using language skills in the community/internships/volunteer service. Through line from primary to middle and high school to support involvement in the arts (performance and music).
 - CREST – want to see an impact on deep learning about environmental science and technology in the middle school/high school. Spaces at CREST for ISEF. Level research.
 - High-performing schools – want to prevent overcrowding at two comprehensive high schools. “I do not think we can have high performing schools if they are overcrowded.” Concern if the options on the table will meet the projected enrollment growth. Is there confidence that students will move to the new high school at ACMS? Is there an option to expand at WLHS as well as WHS?
 - High performing includes college prep and workforce/career learning.
 - Mention of Sabin-Schellenburg – wide breadth of options.
 - Six period day limits opportunity for CTE participation.
- 2. How do you see a facility investment improving upon these programs and initiatives? What do you hope current and future students will experience?**
- Language lab, library resources in world language.
 - Performance spaces/spaces dedicated for sharing learning (i.e. Bolton State) that can also be used for community use.
 - Facilities for deep science learning at all levels. Spaces, equipment for high level research.
 - Partnership for CTE programs (we may not be able to create the facilities for all CTE programs) i.e. World of Speed, OIT.

Framework for Excellence Notes from Table Group No. 20

2. How do you see a facility investment improving upon these programs and initiatives? What do you hope current and future students will experience?

- STEM: What about wood shop/metal shop? We need to teach skills in high school (like Benson High School).
- More technology like 3D modeling (math, spatial relationships). Get students involved in the process and find sponsorships.
- Do we know what students want? Have we surveyed students and community?
- Can we expose students to the opportunities prior to a survey so that they actually know what the opportunities are?
- Life skills examples are simple mechanics, home repairs, household skills. This build independence.
- People like the idea of CTE programs at high school – centralized programs that all kids can access.

- Concer about where kids may be bused to go to school – we want safe ways for students to get to school such as walking paths.
- We want all students to have access to all programs (CTE/specialized programs). We can share the building by busing mid-day to access programs.
- Technology to support the work and spark imagination.

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Co-curricular – students most involved tend to be the most successful at school.
- Safe and welcoming schools – potential safety hazards: automatic lock systems because some schools are antiquated.
- After school/STEM – activities that are inclusive and provide additional learning opportunities outside of the school day.
- Inclusivity – students with disabilities need facilities that address their needs in both facility and programming.
- Additional CTE opportunities to increase access for students.

Other comments: Students are asking for pathways via electives. Can we create after-school spaces to provide STEM/Make Space/CTE opportunities at schools and at CREST for improved performing arts spaces and high-quality libraries?

- Early childhood – now we have space available and it needs to be expanded to more schools so that it's sustainable.
- Cultural diversity – need to create connection between all diverse communities – “safe and welcoming” schools. Beautiful spaces help promote inclusion – motivate students to want to come to schools.
- Community meeting spaces to help connect school to community (near entrance and account for parking).
- How can we as leaders within our State attract more diversity of families and employees?
- Safety and security must be addressed!

Other comments: Willamette Neighborhood Association – second Wednesday of every month at the Police Station at 7 p.m. It would have been a good idea to include the neighborhood association (Willamette and Bolton in particular) in discussion. We feel left out and could have given you insight into the pros and cons.

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Visual and Performing Arts – gathering place for community at large as well as serving our students. It's important to have gathering spaces.
- Safe and Welcoming Schools – Very important to continue strengthening this aspect.

- CREST – valuable for our students and community. Field trips and extra-curricular as well.
- CTE – continue developing and offering high-performing schools continuing to elevate and ensure this happens.

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Students need to move – recess and PE are important!
- Cultural diversity – two parents have children in immersion programs at Lowrie and Trillium.
- Inclusive Services – Importance of exposing our students to learners of all styles and abilities.
- Health and Wellness standards significantly impact our students (at WLHS). This connects to inclusivity.
- Safe and Welcoming schools – having programs that help our students feel safe and supported.
- Students who feel marginalized because they don't fit into the high academic culture (if you're not on the honor roll, you're a loser")
- Career and Technical Education – students who aren't college bound need opportunities to thrive in other areas. World of Speed program offers another avenue.
- WLWV has less credit in HIS opportunities than you might expect in such an affluent district.
- One parent mentioned the big differences (previously) between middle schools.
- Technology – if we don't keep up with technology, our students will be left behind. Comfort level with technology. Teacher voice: we need to make sure educators are prepared to utilize the technology.
- Do we have funds for technology training and IT to support it?
- Inside locking doors for classrooms.

Other comments:

- Kitchens – health and nutrition and business
- Workshops – reuse, repurpose, build, create
- Space to move during day beyond the gym
- One classroom for every teacher

- Farm-to-table – feature farming all schools

- Art Tech highlight individualized programs are a positive.

- Maintain flexibility
- Listen to the wisdom of teachers
- Inclusive services and opportunities for all, considering CTE program more partnering with community businesses, apprenticeships programs.
- Make sure that CTE is not only focus as the “new thing,” consider all learners.
- In primary schools, some parents are teaching science/technology through enrichment. Shouldn’t all students get opportunities to learn this earlier in primary schools?
- How do we think about hands-on learning as inspiring to all students, not just if they are on CTE track?
- How are we meeting the interests and needs of all students, not a one size fits all approach?
- It’s important to not label kids or pre-judge what they will do or how they can learn, how do we cultivate a culture that allows children to explore all kinds of learning?
- We need to continue to maintain small class sizes to maximize student learning, but not too small so that interactions maintain rich.

2. How do you see a facility investment improving upon these programs and initiatives? What do you hope current and future students will experience?

- How can our facilities support health learning for students, activity, and nutrition?
- Update all schools with secure office entrances.
- Make sure there are maker spaces in middle schools.
- Maintain flexible learning spaces so learning environment sizes are maximized, and individual needs can be met.

2. How do you see a facility investment improving upon these programs and initiatives? What do you hope current and future students will experience?

- To showcase STEM: new buildings or renovations should incorporate sustainable design. For example, having a LEED certified building. this could be a demonstration for other districts to see how the district is dedicated to sustainability. In addition, it can save long-term on energy costs.

- Early childhood education programs are NOT a high priority. Parents should take care of this.

- Continue to grow STEM/develop community partnerships.
- Literacy – reading and writing.

Other comments: Health and wellness helps with a lot of stud and helps teach kids/others about how it works and makes them try new things. CREST in particular has helped students meet new people.

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Theater education is important: there currently isn’t enough space at Wilsonville High. Increase audience capacity and turn the existing theater space into physical space for inadequacies such as fly-space, dressing rooms, band/pit area, audience capacity, etc.
- Early childhood programs bring families into schools from the beginning. First teacher to preschool builds relationships and trust.

- CREST – as a teacher utilizing and learning from CREST to expand my own science learning and bring that to my students.
- Safe and welcoming schools have been critical. Building is a big problem at the middle school and high school and that needs to be addressed. I would like to see girl/boy specific issues addressed as well as sexual assault and domestic violence in the homes.
- A group of students have flowed through the Wilsonville High School theater department over the past 15 years while I have been a volunteer. We do not have a facility that fits the performing arts department or the middle school musical (100 students inter-district). The self-esteem of the teachers and students has exceeded the current theater facility A new theater would make a significant impact on the extended community.

2. How do you see a facility investment improving upon these programs and initiatives? What do you hope current and future students will experience?

- Specific preschool spaces in all elementary school playgrounds.
- Continue to develop and expand CREST for outdoor learning and environmental sciences.
- Bullying – less girl competitions and more girl cooperation. Less classism and entitlement.
- Theater – more inter-district collaboration and integration with the community.

Framework for Excellence Notes from Table Group No. 22

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Career Technical Education – invest in spaces that promote more career tech at all ages – hands on connection to careers that lead to college and those that don't necessarily lead to college – farming, auto-mechanics provide avenues for post-high school.
- Facilities through an equity lens – how do buildings contribute to equity/achievement for all?
- Credit recovery – what are early indicators so we can catch kids before that? After school programs that can support that?

- Balancing the things that help children while increasing their education with creative thinking and self-awareness.

1. Which of these programs/initiatives have significantly impacted you/your child and how do you see these progressing into the future?

- Inclusive Services: Do a better job so that students with disabilities don't feel separated from their peers.

- Nicer parking lots with better drainage and maybe consider multi-level parking lots.

I hope that the theater department continues to grow and inspire other kids and adults to support or be a part of the whole experience, by building a new theater. With more seats in the theater, more people can be inspired like I was. Also, other community projects can use the space as well as the theater.

Has the district surveyed enough students and parents to be confident that enough students will move from both high schools to ATHs to take the pressure off the comprehensive high schools? I think a modest expansion at both high schools, along with the expanded ATHs will be needed to truly address the building/learning space issues, especially since they already exist at WLHS.

Additional Comments, Ideas, Suggestions, Concerns

The following are additional questions, comments, ideas or suggestions as submitted by Bond Summit participants.

1. It is very important and imperative to put time and effort and money into the counseling department at all schools. Specific examples of helping students with special needs and disabilities such as 504 and helping kids learn to advocate; counselors helping to identify options for best environments moving forward, i.e. moving to high school. Making sure those counselors who work with 504 plans are trained in disabilities and why those kids are on them. Having enough trained counselors that kids have accessibility to those counselors to keep our kids safe!
2. Strong disappointment that Wilsonville High School Auditorium did not get updated in the last bond. People thought they were voting for this.
3. If, or when, Art Tech new location takes place – sharing that space with the charter school is necessary. We'd love a "field trip week" there. Same with CREST – we'd love that! Same school district so resources should be shared.

4. If the CREST Center were moved to the old Athey/new ATHS site, capacity would increase for classroom/lab activity. It would also be more centrally located and available to all district schools. Field adjacent to the river could resurrect the farm.
5. NEW PRIMARY SCHOOLS – Plan for class sizes we COULD have, not the class sizes we HOPE to have. Six years ago class sizes of 30 were not uncommon in grades 4-5 Room size, number of lockers/cubbies, activity room size and facilities should be considered in new schools for largest possible class sizes.
6. For new primary schools, survey teachers on needs. Some thoughts: With the regular use of technology, teachers frequently use projectors to model lessons, show student work, use curriculum resources, etc. This work would greatly be facilitated by ceiling-mounted projectors as in secondary schools. Some new primary schools have been built without common eating spaces (cafeterias) and students eat in their classrooms. Teachers have consistently expressed dissatisfaction with this for a number of reasons (i.e room cleanliness, transition time especially for K-2 students). Storage space, bulletin board space, and white board space have significant impact on teaching and learning. Teachers should be consulted on classroom design. Classroom libraries are crucial to teaching literacy now. How can furniture and installations best support this?
7. Within each project make accessibility/UDL a top priority. An example is disability seating in arts auditorium or stadium included throughout, not just up front or back or side. Inclusive access is key.
8. Pool parents, families, and students who live these lives daily. They can take you far.
9. What is being done to assess the likely voter response to the level of expenditure planned in the bond request? Other than this meeting).
10. The district should think carefully about the role of Arts and Technology High School/ This school can serve as a core for CTE programs. However, ATHS is currently used as a last resort for students who are not performing well in other schools. The reasons students arrive at ATHS are not necessarily limited to CTE interests. In our experience WLHS failed our son, and in educational needs leaving ATHS as his only option in the

district, even though the curriculum at ATHS was less suited for his interests. That was an unfortunate outcome.

11. How do we consider the facility needs for projected enrollment 10-20 years from now with this current list of potential bond projects?
12. How do we create learning environments that allow the strengths of all students to shine?
13. How do we incorporate an ever-changing work environment with our education curriculum and corresponding facility needs?
14. Is there enough funding allocated for technology and equipment for CTE curriculum.
15. Convert Arts and Technology High School to a regular high school that houses the ATHS program. Offer unique STEM and special programs partners with community and make it a magnet high school. In that way, it de-stigmatizes ATHS program and will allow for more students to enroll.
16. Wood Middle School's entrance needs to move to the west side of the building facing Boones Ferry to recapture "stinky sock-smelling room" space and actually safeguard access to the building because so many people enter the building without the office's knowledge. Please use space currently occupied by office as a maker space for Wood student. It would be centrally located for lunch/after-school programs and could use existing glass windows/doors. Other middle schools have this space (or will in new plans) but this could really keep our oldest middle school strong, safe, and updated for the future.
17. Wilsonville High School should have had auditorium build under the 2014 bond. So it should automatically be included in 2019 bond (Wilsonville voters were stunned when their bond dollars did not go to this full auditorium project). Therefore, the Wilsonville High School auditorium should be built but ADDITIONALLY Wilsonville High School should get space for STEM (Commensurate with West Linn High School 700 building)

and not just converting old auditorium to CTE space. Wilsonville High School may still need two auditorium spaces to accommodate band/choir/drama, etc. and then needs the additional CTE and STEM lab/maker space. Would like to see black box space reclaimed to science use.

18. Wilsonville High School space needs input from choir/band/drama departments to reconfigure what was built last bond and what needs to be built for the new auditorium and to make it workable and leave meaningful space for CTE, STEM, and maker space.
19. Need to save some construction money on building new schools by cutting the architectural piece. Use plans from schools we've just build and paid for at new schools. Architects for this district seem well paid and have won design awards, but too costly when we need money put into building not the next design.
20. Safety and extracurricular activities. The kids most involved tend to succeed academically.
21. After-School opportunities; a performing arts center in Wilsonville.
22. Inspire students, taking advantage of each student's strengths. Building flexible spaces, thinking about our teachers, gym spaces for additional health and wellness.
23. Other activities aside from sports, preparing students for life after high school.
24. World language programs, mental health support, bullying.
25. What can we do as leaders to attract more families of color? Early childhood programs?
26. Potential Capital Bond Projects – Buildings help keep kids safe, but it's adults that keep them safe.

27. Accessibility for all areas, so that kids with special needs can be with their peers. Playgrounds with no bark chips are needed. Add turf to playgrounds for kids who are in wheelchairs so they can be with their peers (or other equipment like walkers). Access for students to sit with peers at Wilsonville High School and West Linn High School: track and stadium. Currently, students, including student athletes with special needs, cannot get into seats in the stands with peers from the track. Community members also have difficult access.
28. Special needs access in old and new buildings – ramps; try to decrease use of stairs in new buildings; elevators cannot be used in fire drills. Have someone in the building team who is an expert on access (not just minimal ADA guidelines). Consider wheelchair use, safe evacuation, sensory calming buildings.
29. In lieu of dots I am going to write out my thoughts. I stand behind all of these projects and appreciate the thought and effort behind them. While I learned a lot today, I still have many questions I feel that there is a disconnect between CTE and whether it means STEM or trades. There should be a more concrete description of what the Athey High school will look like and what will be available at the other high schools. Also, why is there not a central location for community arts and events such as graduations. If we are funding \$25 million for a smaller theater, why not spend a little more and have actual capacity for events? As a family connected to many throughout the district and located in the middle, we need more connection and less West Linn vs. Wilsonville.
30. Spend \$10 million to expand Athey Creek and accommodate 150 additional middle school students. Spend less than \$78 million in land acquisition and construction of a new high school that is centrally located. Sell the Dollar Street Sites it's too sloped and can't be used effectively as a school. **ONE DOT.**
31. WLWV "advertises" that it is inclusive. How can this be better seen in facilities?> Going beyond ADA baseline regulations and making access for all a lens is needed. (many examples of playground and athletic needs for improved access).
32. How will accountability for costs and decisions made based on actual costs be addressed during the building phase? Noted examples of cost over runs, lack of transparency in other districts recently.

33. Importance of making community partnerships happen through facilities use, i.e. could Wilsonville Community Theater group have access to improved Wilsonville High Performing Arts Center?
