Advanced Placement (AP) Courses

- WHS offers 26 different courses that represent every content area
- Increases strength of schedule
- Demonstrates that students have taken advantage of college preparatory curriculum
- Bonus point on GPA
- Opportunity to earn college credit by passing the AP exam in May

Career Technical Education (CTE)

CTE programs have a sequence of courses (typically three credits) connected to a specific career pathway When a student completes **three credits** in the same CTE program, they will be recognized at graduation with a CTE cord

Seal Biliteracy

The Oregon State Seal of Biliteracy is an award given to students who have studied and attained a high level of proficiency in reading, writing, listening, and speaking in two or more languages by the time they graduate. Any student who scores a 4 or higher on the AP Language and Culture test -Or-

passes the STAMP Assessment will receive the Seal of Biliteracy.

 Students who meet these requirements will be recognized with the Seal of Biliteracy on their diploma and will receive a cord at graduation.



11th Grade Course Options

Language Arts:

• Language Arts 11 or AP English Language

Math:

• Talk with your current math teacher to determine your math placement

Science:

- Do you want to take a year-long lab science, a year-long AP lab science, or a non-lab semester science?
- Consider interest areas and 4-year college admission requirements

Social Studies:

- When will you take Civics or AP Gov't?
- Do you want to take a year-long AP social studies or a semester social studies?
- Consider interest areas and 4-year college admission requirements

Health 2:

- During 11th grade or in 12th grade?
- PE?

World Language:

- Will you continue in your World Language?
- Students need at least two-years of the same world language to go straight to a 4-year college
- Do you want start a World Language?

Electives:

- What are you interested??
- How many electives do you need to fill your schedule?
- Do I want to consider Dual Credit classes?
- Am I close to getting 3 credits in a CTE Pathway?
- If I am in the Dual Language program, how many dual language credits do I have?

Frequently Asked Questions

I am ahead in credits, do I have to select a full schedule?

• For current 10th grade students, you must select a full schedule for 11th grade.

Can I take a class again?

• Depends on the class. Please see our FAQ's on the Course Selection webpage to see which classes you can take more than once.

What is Work Experience?

• Work Experience offers students an opportunity to earn credit for working. A minimum of 90 hours and career-related assignments are required to receive credit. Students do not attend an in-person class. Students earn .5 credit per semester and can be taken for a maximum of 2 credits in the 4 years of high school. This course is graded Pass/Fail.

What if I want to be a Student Assistant (SA), Teacher Assistant (TA), or Office Aide?

• We recommend that students wait until their 12th grade year to be a SA, TA or Office Aide.

- AP courses with a 'C' or better receive a bonus point

- Data used in 4-year college admission process
- Oregon University Recommended GPAs:
 - UO Holistic Review
 - OSU Holistic Review, preferred 3.0 or better
 - Oregon Tech 3.0 Automatic Admit
 - Western Oregon and Eastern Oregon- 2.75 Automatic Admit
 - Portland State and Southern Oregon- 2.5 Automatic Admit
- Oregon Promise
 - 2.0 or higher

Research College and Career Options



Career & College Options

Associate's Degree/Transfer Degree

- 2-Year Community College
- No GPA requirement for admission
- Oregon Promise- 2.0 GPA or higher
- No world language requirement

Bachelor's Degree

- 4-year College or University
- 2.75 minimum GPA requirement
- 2-year minimum world language requirement

Career Technical Education at a Community College

- Can be completed through a Community College
- On the job training alongside classes
- Apprenticeships, trade school, beauty school

Department of Defense

- High school diploma

- Additional school and training provided

- Must be 18-years old

Work Experience

- Resume needs to be completed

Oregon Promise

- Available at Oregon community colleges
- Applies to an Associate's Degree, Transfer, and most CTE programs
- FREE (for up to 12 credits per term)
- Who is eligible?
 - Oregon high school graduates
 - Graduate with a **2.0 cumulative GPA** or higher by the end of 12th grade
 - Oregon resident for at least 12 months prior to enrolling in college
 - Enroll in Oregon community college within 6 months of high school graduation

SAT/ACT

Should my student consider taking the SAT/ACT? Research your perspective colleges to learn about their Admission Testing Policy

• Almost all colleges accept either the SAT or the ACT for admission

ACT vs. SAT: How to Decide Which Test to Take

Admission Testing Policies



• Test-Optional

 Refers to colleges that give students the choice to submit standardized testing scores if they feel it reflects their true ability. Colleges will consider scores if submitted, but there will not be a penalty for choosing not to submit scores.

• Test-Blind/Test-Free

• Refers to colleges that will not consider standardized testing scores for any applicant, even if submitted.

Test Required

• Refers to colleges that require SAT or ACT scores as a part of their admission requirements.

The Importance of Testing? It Depends...

• Lower Priority:

• The largest set of colleges, about 80% of 4-year colleges. Admission decisions do not hinge on test scores. They mainly look at GPA and course rigor.

• Plus Factor:

• This set of colleges, about 20% of 4-year colleges, are still selective, so strong test scores can be a plus factor, but not a singular difference maker.

• Still Important:

- These highly selective colleges have less than 10% acceptance rates. It is still advisable to take the SAT/ACT.
- We recommend reviewing admission webpages, <u>Compass Prep</u>, or <u>US</u> <u>News</u> for most up-to-date info

If taking the SAT/ACT makes sense for you...

• 9th Grade

• Continue to do the best in your scheduled classes.

• 10th Grade

- PSAT in October
- PreACT in March

• 11th Grade

- PSAT in October
- SAT in spring (March, May or June)

Practice for the SAT

- Take the PSAT in October of 10th and 11th grade year at WHS.
 - Student registers by paying the bookkeeper in August during registration usually \$20.00
- Prepare for SAT
 - CollegeBoard has partnered with Khan Academy to provide personalized SAT practice.
- Register for SAT in Junior year
 - Collegeboard.org
 - The SAT or the ACT is typically taken in the spring of the junior year and no later than November of the senior year.

PreACT for 10th Grade Students

- WHS will offer 10th grade students the opportunity to take the PreACT.
- Friday, March 14, 2025 from 8:30 am to 12:00 pm. at WHS
- Students can register <u>HERE</u>.
- Registration will close at 5:00 pm on Friday, February 28th.

 The PreACT is a low-stakes, testing experience for four-year, college bound students. Score reports provide an insight into students' predicted performance on the ACT, and include valuable career indicators. What Can 9th & 10th Grade Students Do Now?

- Continue to do the best that you can in your classes!
- Be thoughtful about your course planning and strength of schedule
- Get involved in a meaningful activity and document/track your participation
- Consider community service for scholarships
- Become familiar with Naviance for college and career research
- Meet with your school counselor

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Naviance

- Web-based software purchased by the district to assist in the college and career planning process
- Naviance access:
 - Log into student's WHS Google account
 - WHS Website>For Students>Naviance>Single Sign-On
- Research and explore colleges
 - SuperMatch or College Match
 - College Lookup
- Access college data and acceptance history (WHS graduates 2006-2024)
- Sign-up for virtual/in-person visits with college admission reps
- Create resume
- Students will also use Naviance during their senior year to request transcripts, to request letters of recommendation, and to access the scholarship database.
