

Course Selection Timeline

• February 6:

- O Juniors will attend an assembly in the PAC during Life class to review course selection information.
- O Life 103 teachers will hand out the Course Request Form.

• February 6-24:

 Students will connect with teachers and their school counselor about their classes for next year and complete their Course Request Form.

• February 25:

• Students will submit their Course Request Form to their Life 103 teacher and will enter their course selections into StudentVUE during Life class.

Course Selection Preparation

- Review the <u>Curriculum Guide</u> courses subject to change
- Meet with teachers to discuss level placements
- Meet with your school counselor to plan out senior year
- Be mindful of unique admission requirements
 - University of California System requires
 - 1-year of the same visual or performing arts course
 - 1-year of World History
 - University of Washington requires
 - 1 semester of a visual or performing arts course



Advanced Placement (AP) Courses

- WHS offers **26** different courses that represent every content area
- Demonstrates to college admission officers that they have sought the most rigorous curriculum available
- Opportunity to earn college credit by passing the AP exam in May

Dual Credit or Advanced College Credit (ACC)

- Dual credit program with Clackamas
 Community College, Portland Community
 College, or Oregon Tech (OIT)
- Opportunity for students to earn transferable community college credit for approved college-level classes
- Students must register for the college credit and will receive the grade earned in the class

Career Technical Education (CTE)

CTE programs have a sequence of courses (typically three credits) connected to a specific career pathway.

When a student completes three credits in the same

CTE program, they will be recognized at graduation with a CTE cord

- Computer Programming
- Digital Arts
- Education
- Journalism
- Engineering

Dual Language Program

To receive the recognition, the Class of 2026 must earn a total of six credits in dual language courses during their four years of high school.

- Spanish Language and Literature 1
- Spanish Language and Literature 2
- AP Spanish Literature and Culture
- AP Spanish Language and Culture
- Biology- Spanish
- Modern US History- Spanish
- Latino Arts and Culture

Seal of Biliteracy

The Oregon State Seal of Biliteracy is an award given to students who have studied and attained a high level of proficiency in reading, writing, listening, and speaking in two or more languages by the time they graduate.

- Any student who scores a 4 or higher on the AP Language and Culture test
 -Orpasses the STAMP Assessment will receive the Seal of Biliteracy.
- Students who meet these requirements will be recognized with the Seal of Biliteracy on their diploma and will receive a cord at graduation.

Career & College Options

Associate's Degree/Transfer Degree

- 2-Year Community College
- No GPA requirement for admission
- Oregon Promise-2.0 GPA or higher
- No world language requirement

Bachelor's Degree

- 4-year College or University
- 2.75 minimum GPA requirement
- 2-year minimum world language requirement

Career Technical Education at a Community College

- Can be completed through a Community College
- On the job training alongside classes
- Apprenticeships, trade school, beauty school

Department of Defense

- High school diploma
- ASVAB
- Additional school and training provided
- Travel the world
- Advancement and retirement opportunities
- Must be 18-years old

Options at a Community College?



- Associate's Degree (2 year degree)
 - Community College for 2 years and graduate with an associate's degree.
- Transfer Degree
 - Community college for 1 or 2 years and then transfer to a university for the last
 2 years. Ultimately earning a bachelor's degree.

Options at a Community College?

• CTE Programs (1 or 2 year certificate programs)

- Choose a career technical program at a community college. Go to college for 1 or 2 years.
- O Examples of CTE Programs: EMT, Dental Hygiene Assistant, Cyber Security, Paralegal, Nursing Assistant, Auto Collision Repair, Landscape Technology, and many more.

• Apprenticeship Programs

- Work and take classes at the same time
- Often through a community college
- Examples: Electrician, Plumbing, Painting, Machinist, Construction

What to do now if you are thinking about Community College?

- Step 1:
 - Think about what you will do at the community college
 - Associate's Degree, Transfer Degree or CTE Program
- Step 2:
 - Use Naviance to research Community Colleges in the area.
- Step 3:
 - Make a list of Community Colleges that you want to apply to in the fall of senior year. Put the list of community colleges in Naviance in "Colleges I'm Thinking About".
- Step 4:
 - Look at your transcript to see if you have a 2.0 cumulative GPA or higher for the Oregon Promise.

Oregon Promise



- Oregon Promise helps to cover tuition at any Oregon community college for recent high school graduates.
- Applies to an Associate's Degree, Transfer, and most CTE programs
- Who is eligible?
 - Oregon high school graduates
 - Graduate with a **2.0 cumulative GPA** or higher by the end of 12th grade
 - Oregon resident for at least 12 months prior to enrolling in college
 - Enroll in Oregon community college within 6 months of high school graduation
 - Complete FAFSA/ORSAA senior year



Unsure about a Major or Academic Interest?

It is common for students to be unsure about their major or academic area of interest:

- Inquire about first-year course of studies
- Inquire about when you have to declare a major
- Consider a liberal arts college
- Talk with your school counselor
- Use Naviance
 - Personality, interest, and skill inventories
 - Explore Careers' under the 'Careers' dropdown



Certain about a Major or Academic Interest?

- Consult publications and websites such as U.S. News and World Report, Peterson's, Princeton Review, and Barron's for published ratings
- Investigate the details:
 - Research what courses are required for specific majors or academic programs
 - Number of professors with highest degree in field
 - Research institution vs. teaching institution
 - O Number of students seeking higher education, securing jobs, etc. after graduation
 - Attend a class
 - Meet with a professor in that major or program.
 - Meet with a current student in that major or program

It's all about balance...

• Identify colleges that you consider:

- COLLEGE
- A Safety School-your scores and grades surpass all academic and extracurricular requirements at these schools.
- A Good Fit School- your grades and scores are within the middle 50% of accepted students.
- A Reach or 'Dream' School- your grades and scores may be below the middle 50% of students attending these schools.

NCAA Eligibility Center

- College-bound student athletes must register if you plan to pursue DI or DII college athletics
 - O Register with the NCAA Eligibility Center
- To meet NCAA eligibility requirements and compete at the college level, athletes much complete 16 core courses identified by the NCAA
 - Wilsonville High School NCAA- approved courses include: English 1-4, Algebra 1-3,
 Geometry, Statistics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, American History, World History, Civics,
 Government, and World Language.

SAT/ACT

What should I do?

 Research your perspective colleges to learn about their Admission Testing Policy

 Almost all colleges accept either the SAT or the ACT for admission

Admission Testing Policies



Test-Optional

• Refers to colleges that give students the choice to submit standardized testing scores if they feel it reflects their true ability. Colleges will consider scores if submitted, but there will not be a penalty for choosing not to submit scores.

• Test-Blind/Test-Free

• Refers to colleges that will not consider standardized testing scores for any applicant, even if submitted.

• Test Required

• Refers to colleges that require SAT or ACT scores as a part of their admission requirements.

If taking the SAT/ACT makes sense for you...

- Decide when you want to take the SAT or ACT
 - The SAT or the ACT is typically taken in the **spring of the junior year** and no later than December of the senior year.
 - Upcoming SAT Dates:
 - Mar 8, 2025
 - May 3, 2025
 - June 7, 2025
 - o <u>SAT Testing Schedule</u>

 - Khan Academy free online test preparation
 - O Princeton Review or Kaplan Test Prep fee based
- Register
 - Register for SAT at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>
 - Register for ACT at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>

The Importance of Testing? It Depends...

• Lower Priority:

• The largest set of colleges, about 80% of 4-year colleges. Admission decisions do not hinge on test scores. They mainly look at GPA and course rigor.

• Plus Factor:

• This set of colleges, about 20% of 4-year colleges, are still selective, so strong test scores can be a plus factor, but not a singular difference maker.

• Still Important:

- These highly selective colleges have less than 10% acceptance rates. It is still advisable to take the SAT/ACT.
- We recommend reviewing admission webpages, <u>Compass Prep</u>, or <u>US News</u> for most up-to-date info

According to the National Association of College Admission Counselors:

- GPA and grades in college preparatory courses
- Strength of schedule
- Essay
- Teacher recommendation
- SAT or ACT test scores, if applicable
- Student's expressed interest in the school
- Counselor recommendation
- Class rank
- Interview, if applicable
- Extracurricular activities

Grade Point Average (GPA)

- Automatic Admit vs. Holistic Review
- OPU Recommended GPAs:
 - O UO Holistic Review
 - OSU Holistic Review, preferred 3.0 or better
 - Oregon Tech 3.0 Automatic Admit
 - O Western Oregon and Eastern Oregon- 2.75 Automatic Admit
 - O Portland State and Southern Oregon- 2.5 Automatic Admit

 - Open for Class of 2026 on October 1, 2025
 - Will use prior-prior year (PPY) for filing (2024 taxes)
 - Purpose is to provide families with more accurate financial aid information earlier in the admission process
