Course Overview

Oregon Literature is a semester-long course designed to familiarize students with local literature and authors. It is an English elective that involves writing, speaking, and projects, with the main focus on reading both fiction and non-fiction. The literature will range from pieces created by Native Americans of the Oregon Territory to works by contemporary Pacific Northwest authors.

Essential Questions

Concepts providing focus for student learning

- What are the different regions of Oregon? What do they have in common and how are they different?
- What are common traits of Oregon-based literature?
- Who are Oregon's authors? What and when did they write?
- Which American Indians are native to this region? What is their literature?
- What is the relationship between people and the natural landscape of Oregon?
- In what ways has Oregon changed historically and how does the literature reflect that?
- What does it mean to be an Oregonian?
- What do contemporary Oregon writers envision for the state's future?
- How do writers from outside the state view Oregon?
- What literary and artistic awards are given in this state and who have been the winners of these awards?

- Gain knowledge of Oregon history.
- Develop an understanding of the Northwest Native American experience.
