Students will extend their ability in acting and performance while also developing a portfolio of theatrical skills. Students will have opportunities to investigate, analyze and interpret classical works for public performance.

# **Proficiency Statements**

Upon completion of course, students will be able to:

- Develop consistent characterizations from classical and modern scripts.
- Demonstrate awareness of self as an actor in performance.
- Use writing to analyze the physical, emotional, and social dimensions of characters found in dramatic scenes and comedic scenes.
- Use background knowledge and experience to translate personal meaning into public performance via playwriting activities.
- Display imagination, originality, creativity, and risk-taking in scripted performances.

- Articulate and justify personal aesthetic criteria for critiquing the work of own and others' performances.

- Demonstrate knowledge of the role theatre plays in society, how the arts contribute to own lives, and how the arts empower people to create performances, which show who we are as a human
