Guidance for Co-Curricular and Out-of-School Activities

Note: Field Trips and school activities require full IEP consideration

Section 504 protections apply to any student receiving Special Education services or on a 504 plan. They may also apply to a student who has a disability that has not yet been identified under SPED or 504 in certain circumstances.

Under Section 504, we have 2 key things to consider:

- Criteria for participation must be non-discriminatory
- Equal opportunity to participate (with reasonable accommodations)

When considering participation in co-curricular and out-of-school activities, follow this process (BE SURE TO KEEP A RECORD OF THIS PROCESS):

- 1. Have a meeting with staff who know the program/activity, staff with knowledge of 504/SPED procedures, and someone who knows the child (could be parent or teacher)
- 2. Communicate with the family to gather information and share specific details of the program/activity
- 3. Clarify the expectations for student behavior, health, and safety in the context of the program/activity
- 4. Clarify the accommodations that are currently in place in the school setting
- 5. Decide what accommodations will be necessary in the activity setting (to best extent possible)
 - a. Accommodations should not change key components of the learning experience for the student or for others. Consider the essential learning or purpose of the activity. Can we run the program/activity with accommodations that don't substantially alter or modify the program for other students?
 - b. Can safety concerns be addressed with reasonable accommodations?
- 6. With those accommodations, will the student be able to meaningfully participate in the activity?
 - a. <u>If YES</u>: Verify the resources needed for those accommodations and communicate the plan with parents and staff
 - b. <u>If NO</u>: Communicate with the family about the reasons and process fees or other resources will be refunded Consider participation in alternate activities

Families can be wonderful resource. We can invite families to problem-solve with us.

- We cannot require parents to attend the program/activity if we don't require parents of nondisabled children to attend.
- We also cannot require parents to pay any additional costs that other parents don't pay.

Accommodations may include:

- adjustments to schedules
- adjustments to supervision
- adjustments to participation in particular activities
- providing additional training for some staff members
- providing additional equipment
- additional staff to attend the activity
- other accommodations deemed necessary

Accommodations may not modify the essential learning or purpose of the activity

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
