

#### Varsity Football "Didn't"










### Frosh Football: Philosophical




#### Juniors Upset Powderpuff





#### Varsity Cross Country Adjusts

#### JV CC Looks for Win






#### Varsity Volleyball Spirited



At the end of the season, Jill Buse was named to The Wilco All-Star Team. This is an honorable title for a junior to receive.











#### School Records Broken


#### Girls' Gymnastics Improv 3
















#### J.V. Gymnastics Promising




#### Lions Str. s Teamwork


regulation play, but lost by three in overtime.

#### J.V. Posts Best Season



In the girls' third season they did really well. Their win/loss record for the season was 12 wins and 10 losses. In league play their record was seven wins and five losses.




The team's two main strong points were at the free throw line and they also played good consistant defense. They did have a little trouble scoring when they really needed the points, however.



#### Sweetheart Week Hectic






#### Ski Team Grounded




Steve Bowerman and Rick Colarchik were high placers for the boys' team, which had a sixth or seventh placing, with Bowerman taking eighth place among the guys.


In anticipation of the short Christmas holidays, students joined in the Elks'-sponsored canned food drive, gathering over 2500 cans, which benefited the needy in our community.




#### Christmas Ball; a Quiet Interlude





#### Varsity Baseball Season 11-19



who led his team in hitting, made prep AllAmerican, the first West Linn player to achieve that honor.




















In the pitching department the team was led by Mike Mangold, Bob Barnes, Glen Doty, and Todd Campbell.

The J.V. team was composed of all sophomores. These players, combined with the sophomores on the varsity team, will provide a good nucleus for a winning team.





#### Golfers Fluctuate


The golf team started this season with high hopes, returning three lettermen from last year's winning team and sporting a young team composed of two freshmen, three sophomores, four juniors and two seniors.



cost the young Lions three meets and 18 points.






















#### Tennis Returns to West Linn





In Debutantes the coveted "Deb of the Year Award" was presented to a smiling Sheri Granquist.







Mr. Hibbard then introduced each of the honor graduates, emphasizing the effort and sacrifice that each had put forth, an appropriate ending to a special evening.




## **SOPHOMORES**


## **FRESHMAN**

A big class means lots of spirit, and they've got that. This year has been a preview of what can be expected from these spirited students.



#### Administrators Make Chaiges



As the city of West Linn continues to grow, we all continue to improve.




# Amplifier Came a Long Way

Working cohesively as a tight-knit group, the staff produced "perhaps the best series of Amplifiers in West Linn High School's history," according to adviser Carol Benson.




















# Yearbook Class Difficult




