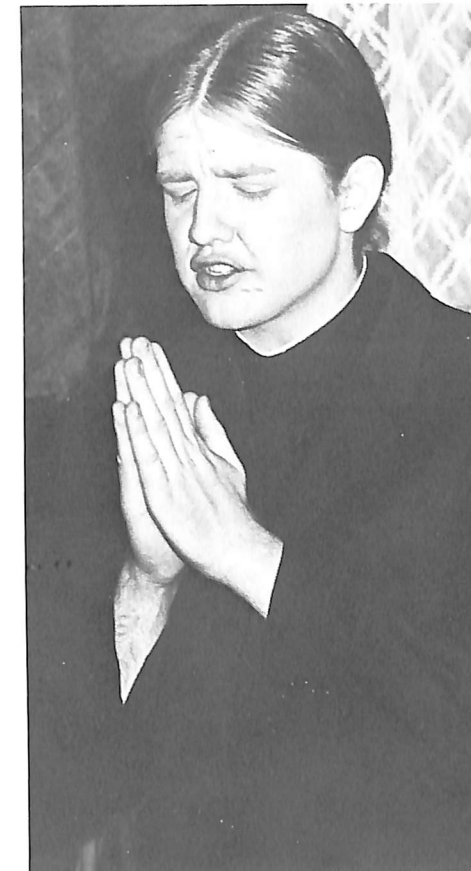

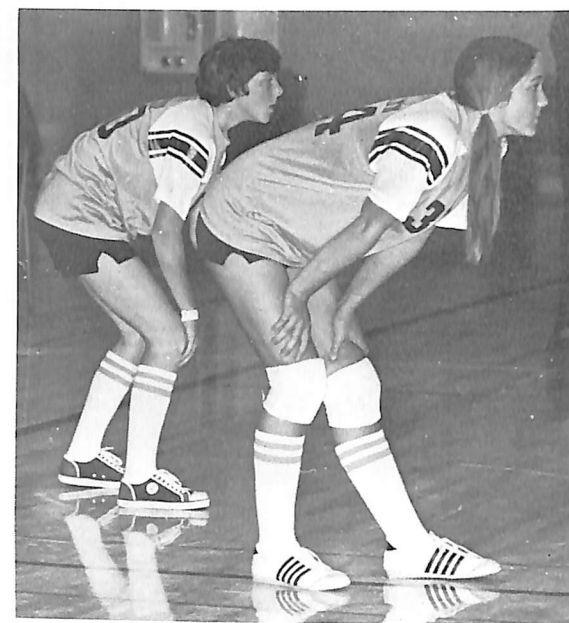
Volleyball

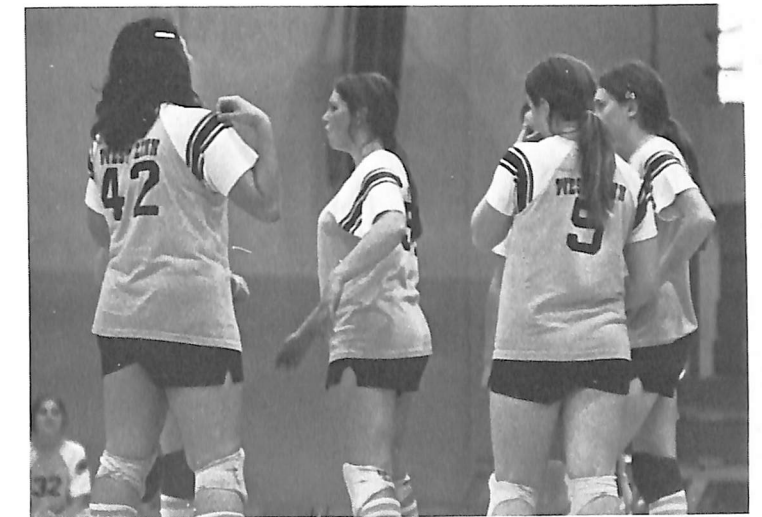

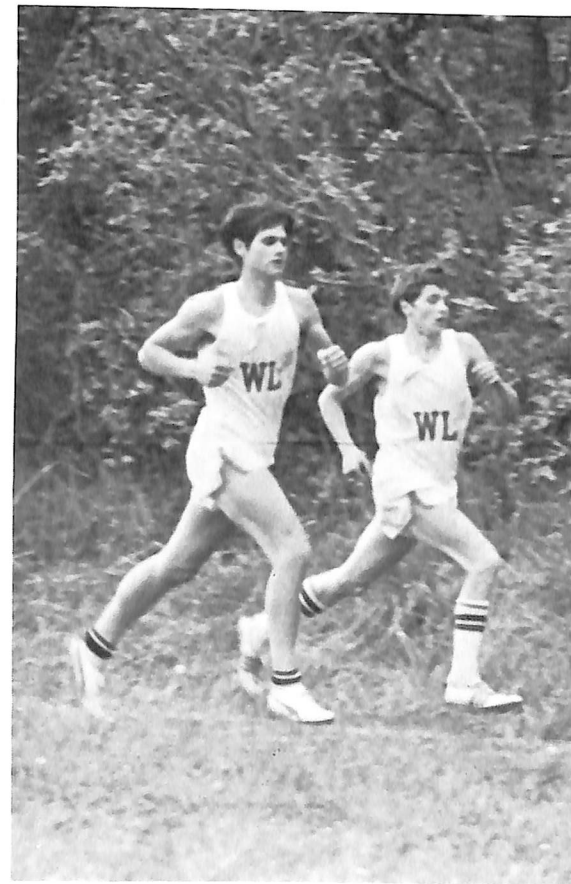

Cross Country



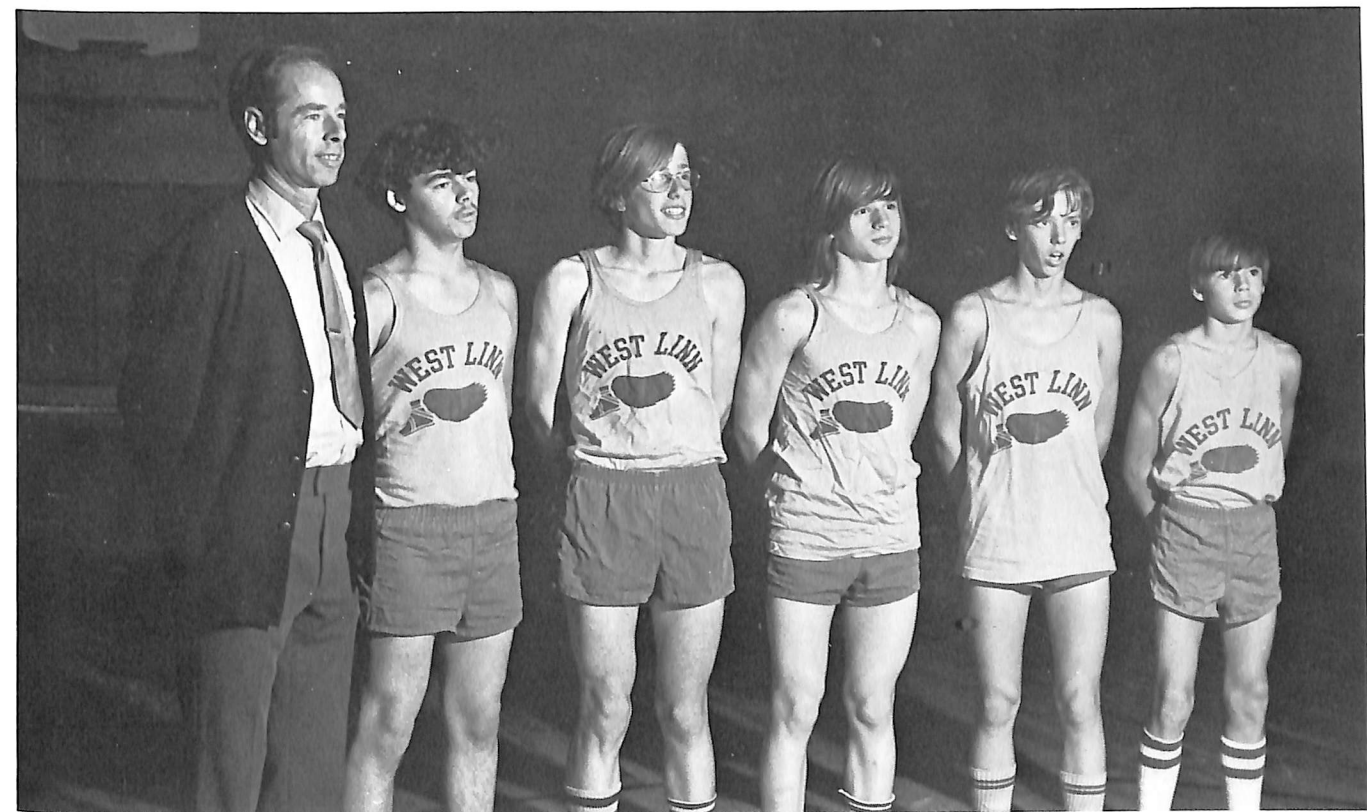

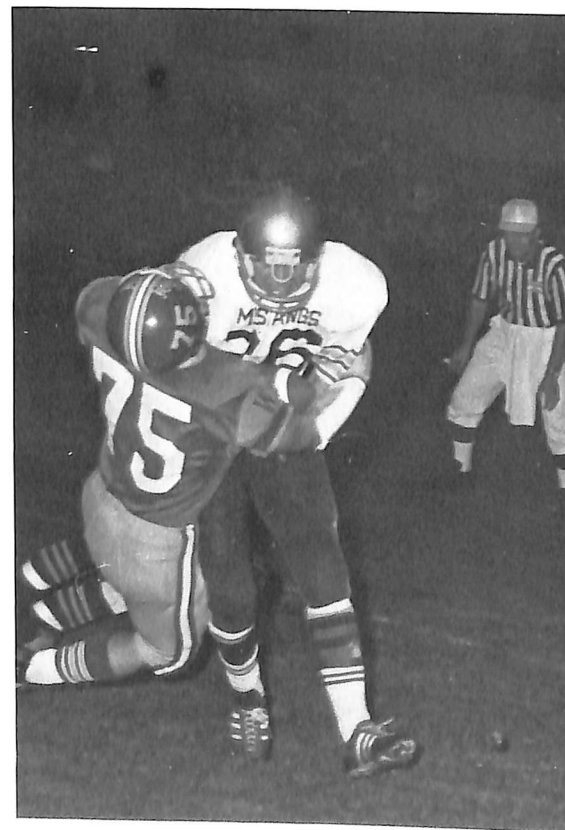

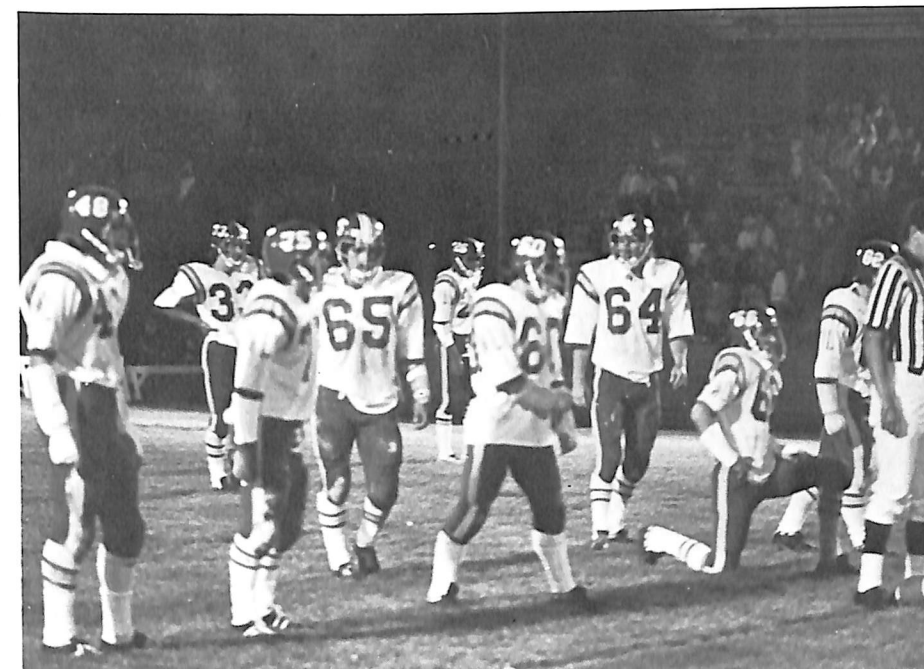
The varsity football team ended the season with a five win, four loss record. The Lions finished fourth out of the seven teams in the Willamette Division. Exciting moments were provided by the Lions' "never die" attitude. The Gresham game was won in the last 30 seconds for our first win over Gresham in Wilco League play. The team bounced back from a half time deficit to post a decisive win over Rex Putnam. Kyle Wood's late second half punt return for a touchdown and Jay Schumaker's two pass interceptions gave West Linn a close win over Clackamas. In the Hood River game John Shultz, deep in our territory came up with two interceptions to preserve a 6-0 lead. An outstanding individual performance was the running of Larry Doty, who accumulated 1087 yards in rushing, pass receiving, punt returns, and kick off returns. John Jenkins, who was voted by the coaches as Most Improved Senior, received nine outstanding line grades out of the nine games played. The team voted Mike Gump as Most Inspirational, and Ray McNamee as the Outstanding Red Shirt. Jeff Steigleder was named Most Valuable Player. Vern Doyle led the league in pass interceptions for the first half of the season. Head Coach Don Rogers commented that they were a spirited, hardworking team which he was proud to be associated with.

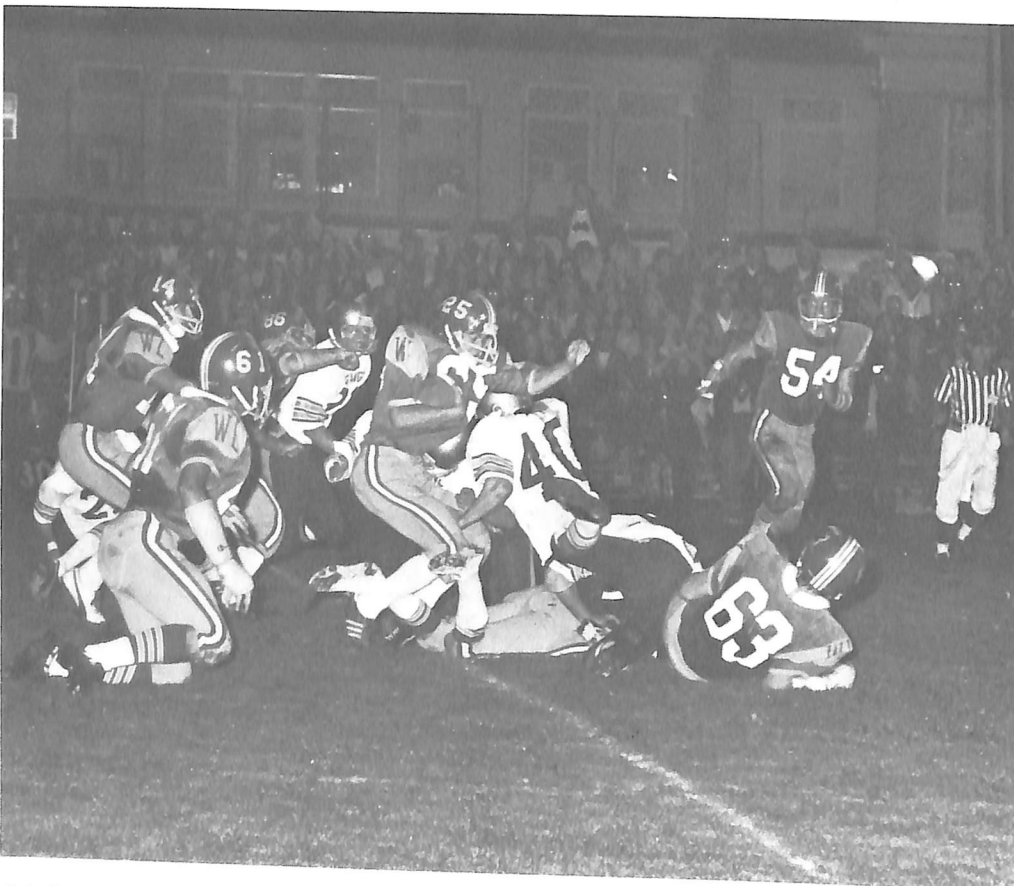

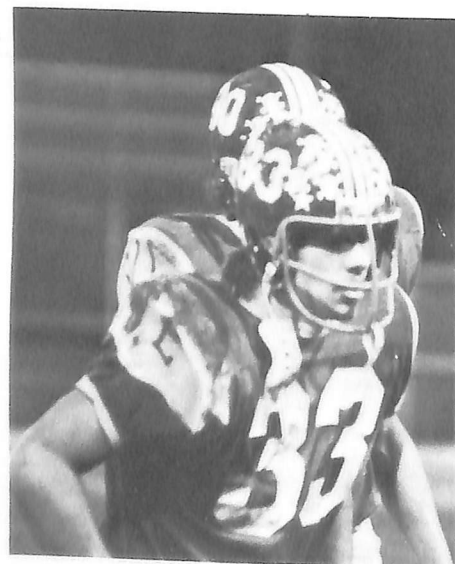

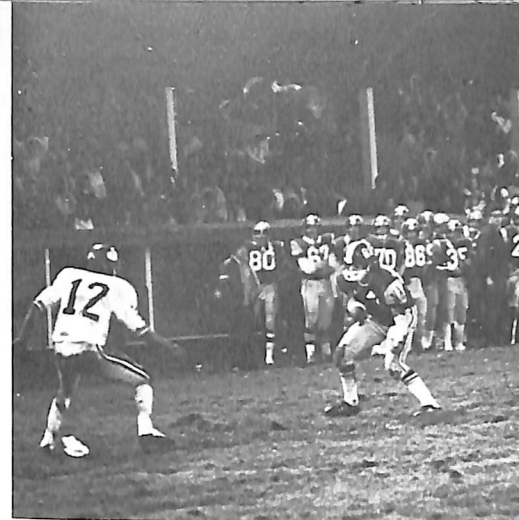

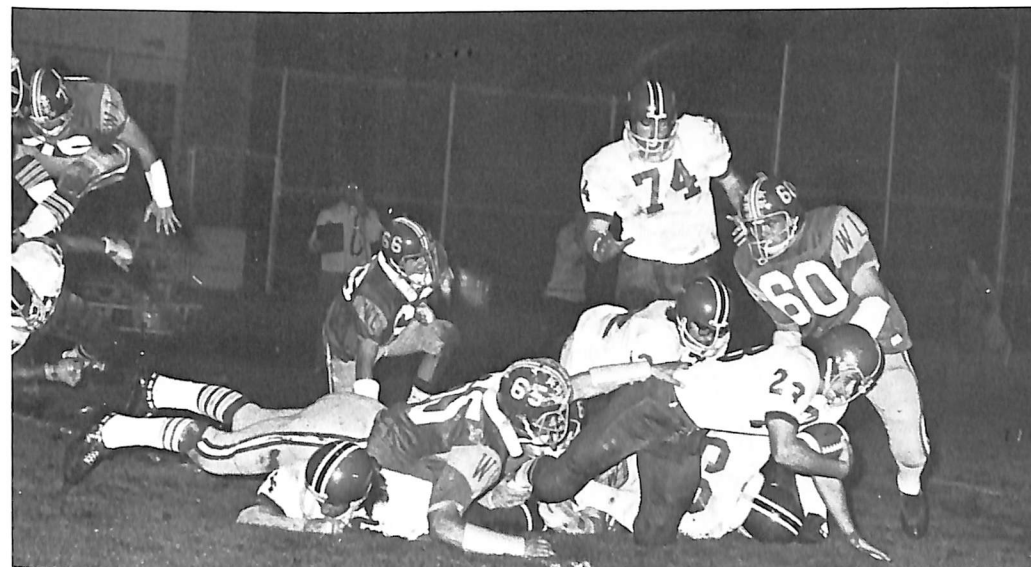

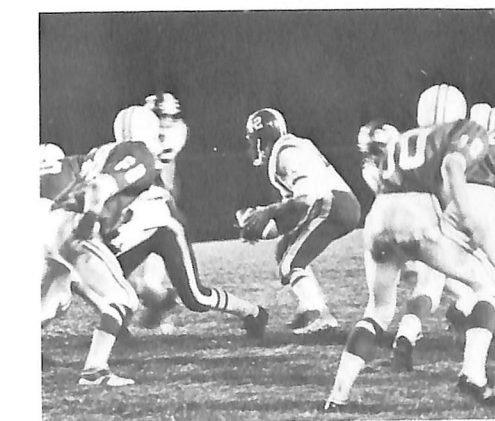

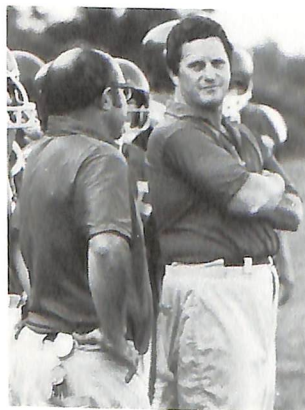

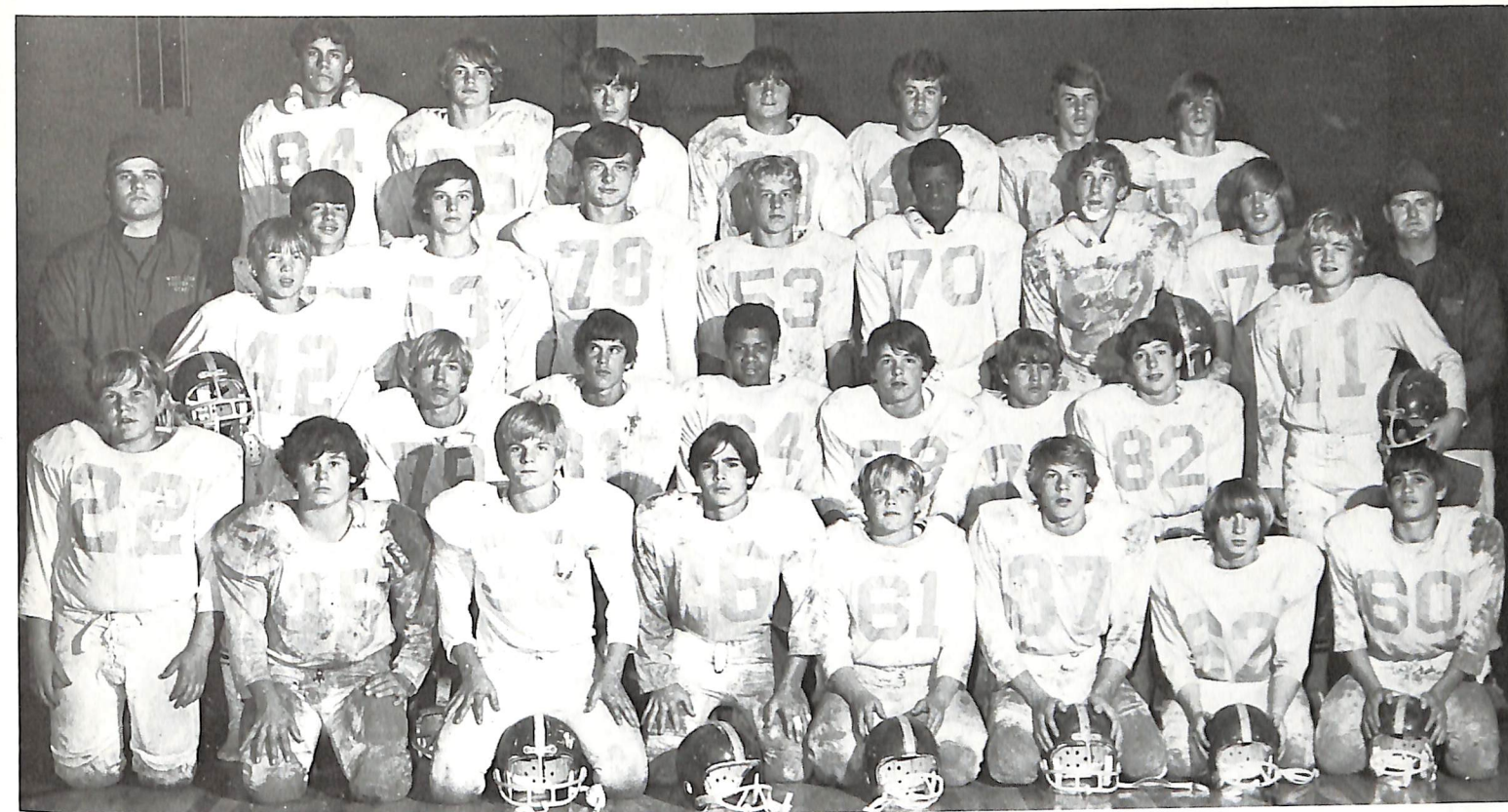

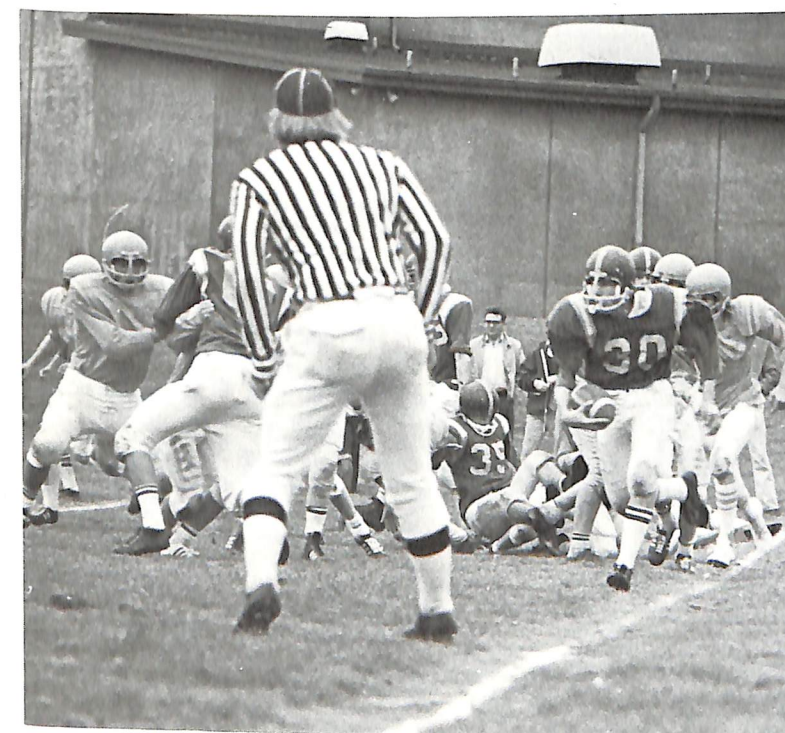

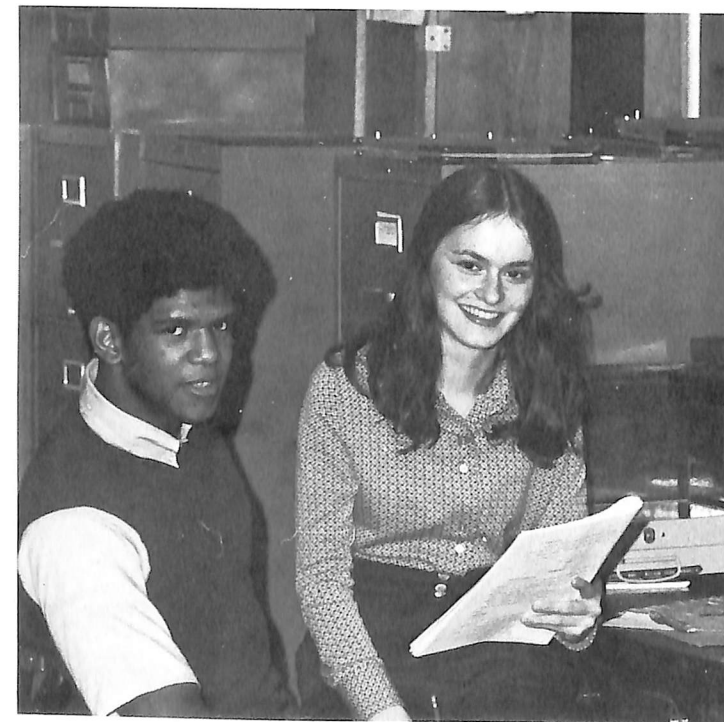

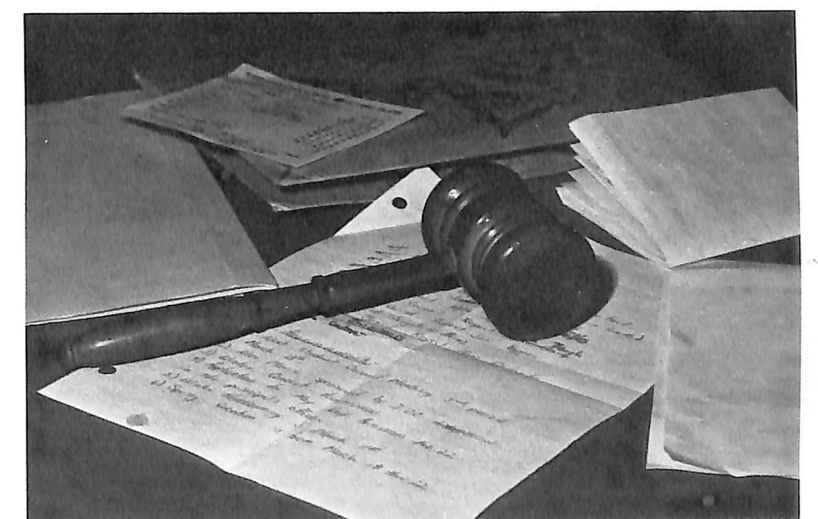

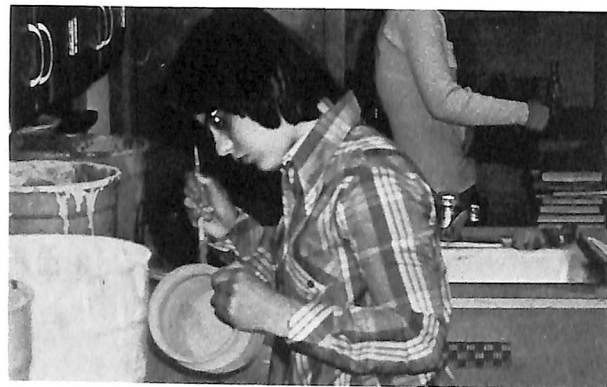

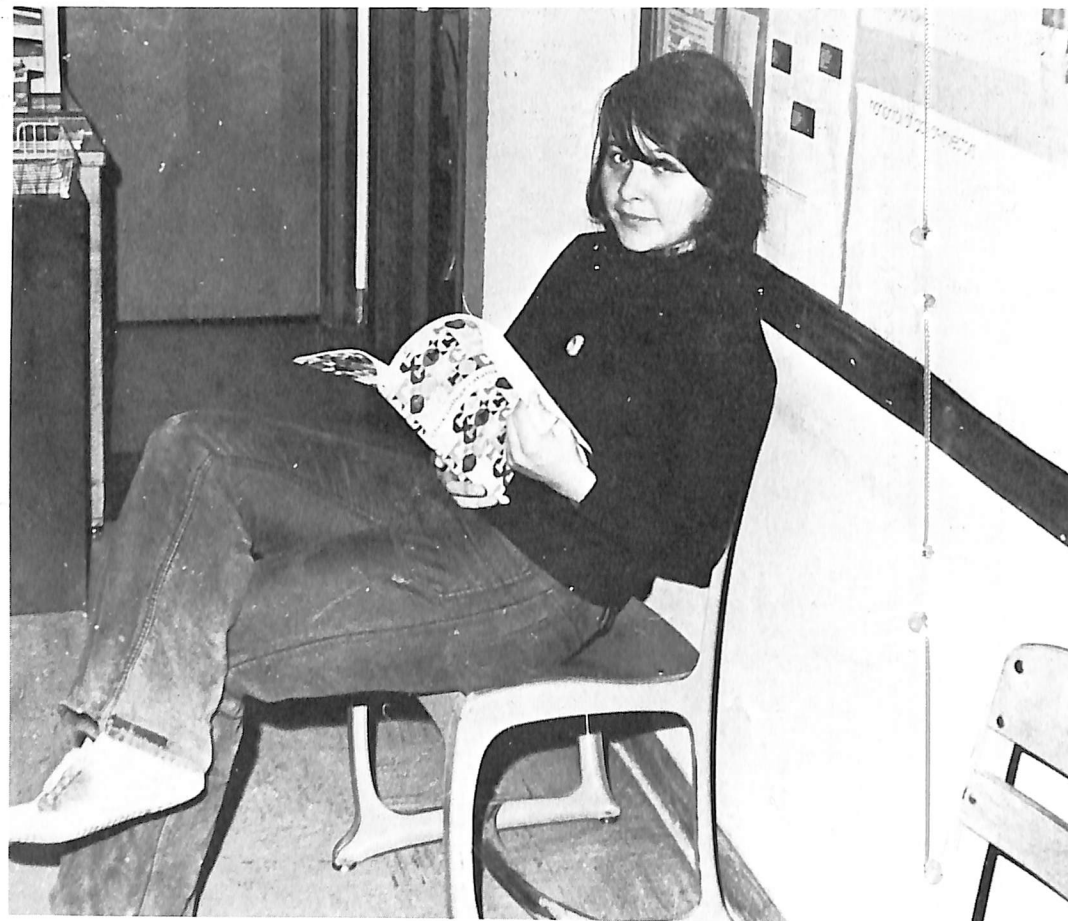

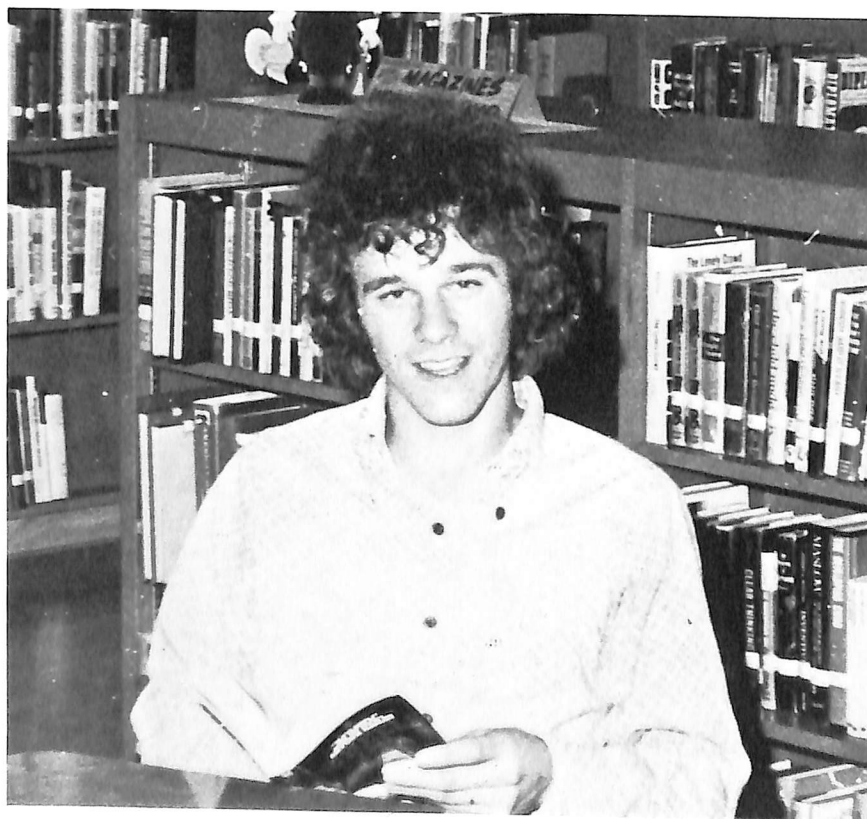

A 21-1 regular season record, best in West Linn and Wilco League history went down the drain as the Lion's game-winning shot rolled off the rim no good with the score at thirty-nine all and two seconds left in the Wilco League title game against Centennial. The following night's loss to Lakeridge ended dreams of a state title, and kept West Linn out of the state tournament for the first time in four years. But even the shot that fate denied cannot tarnish the trophy of this season, a piece still shines brightly. It was the season of No. 1 ratings in the big papers and the small, the season of the "you-yous", a group of swearing, booing maniacs who stood at every personal foul called on the other team to point a relentless finger of harrassment while screaming YOU! 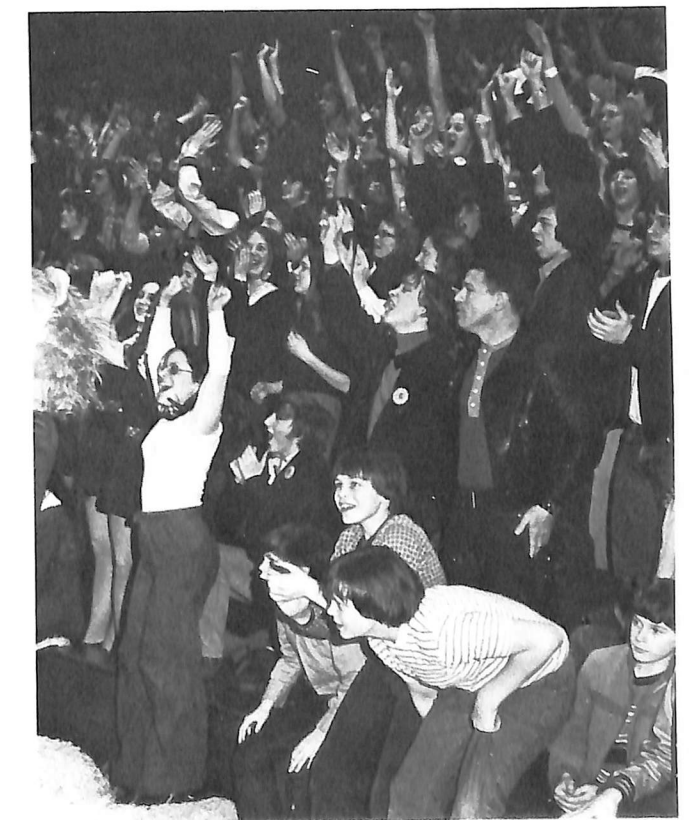

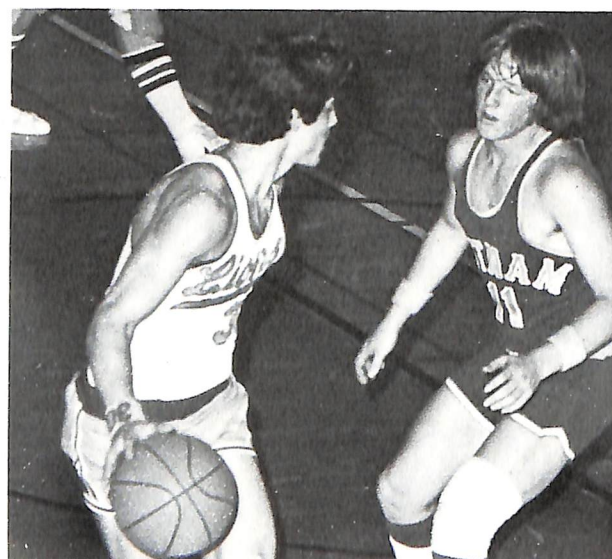

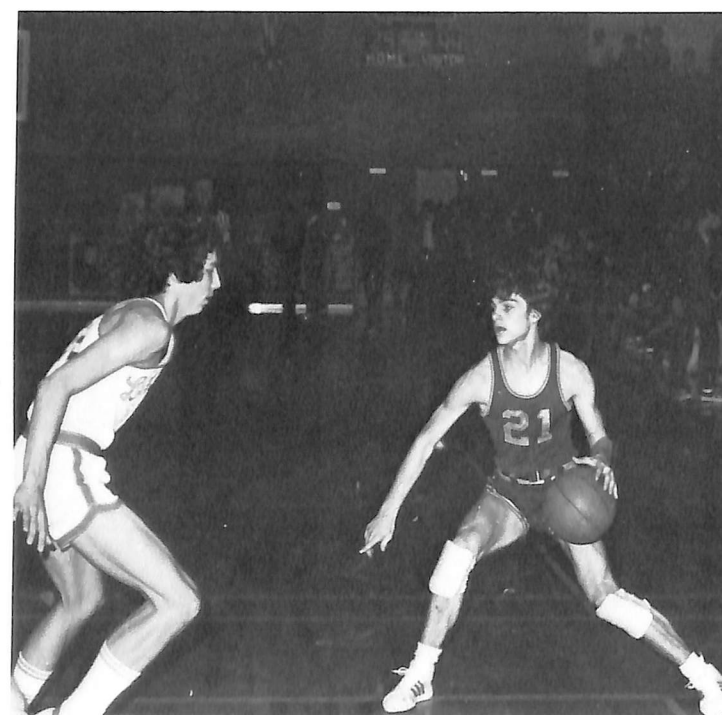

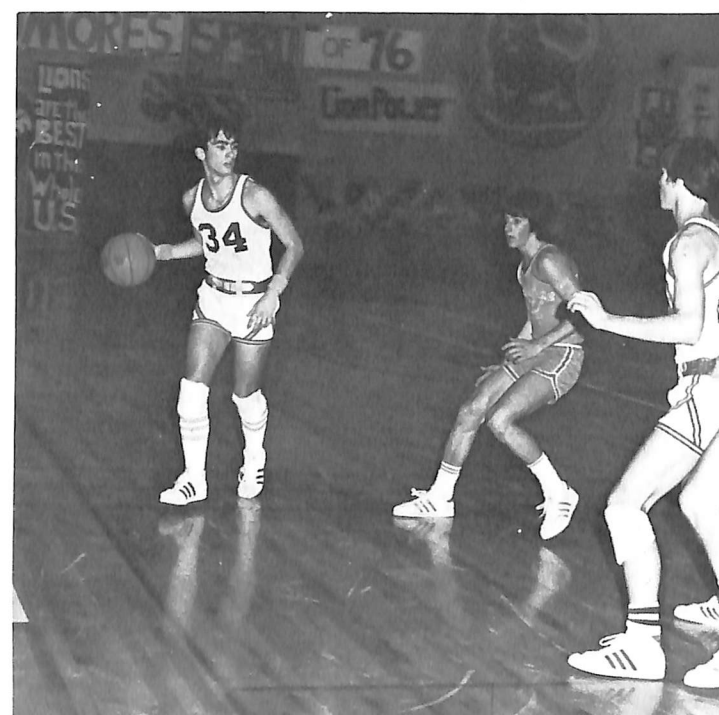

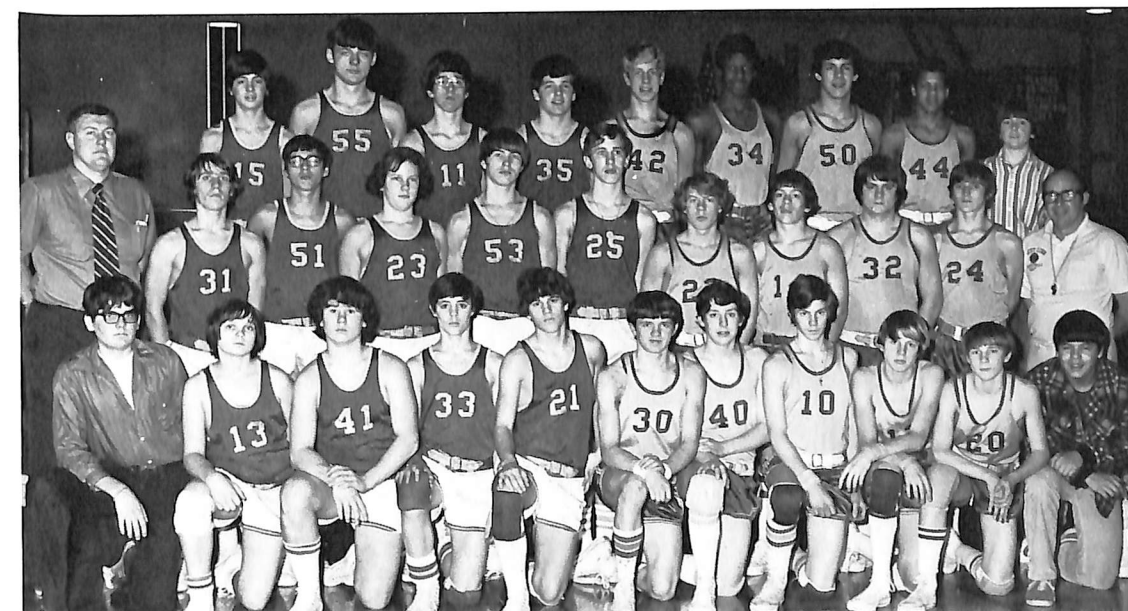

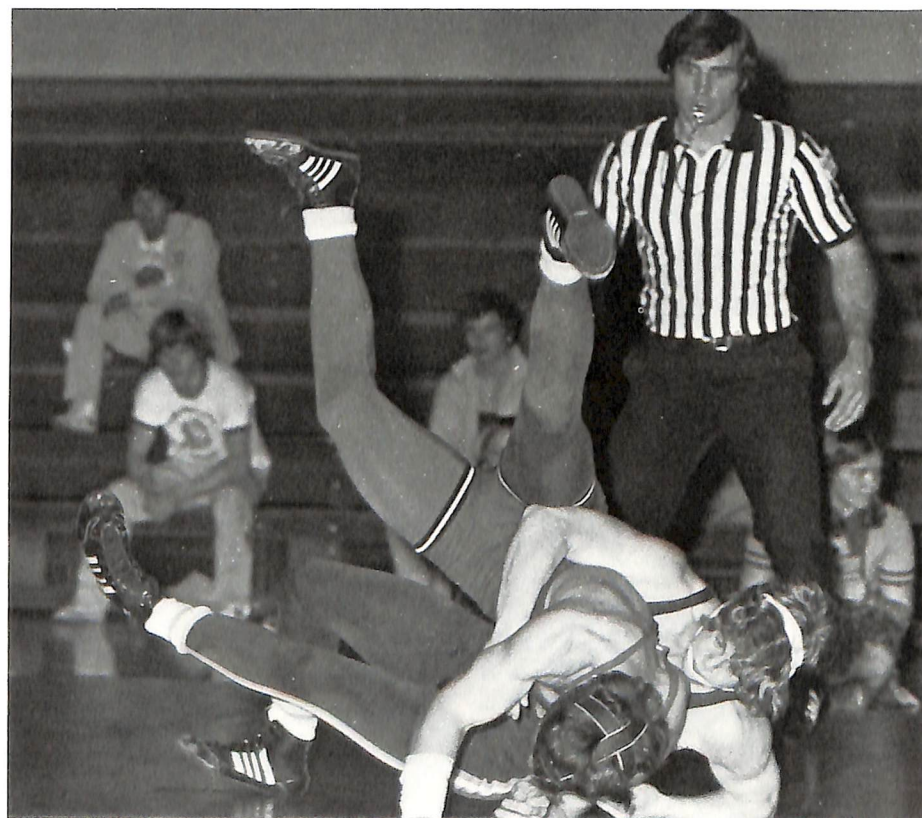

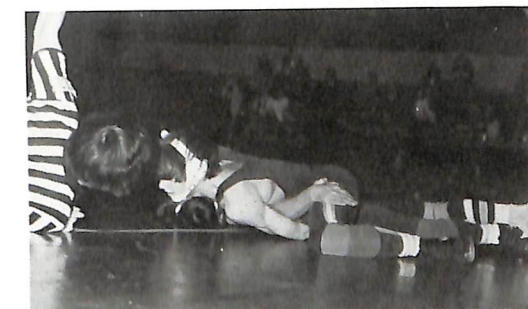

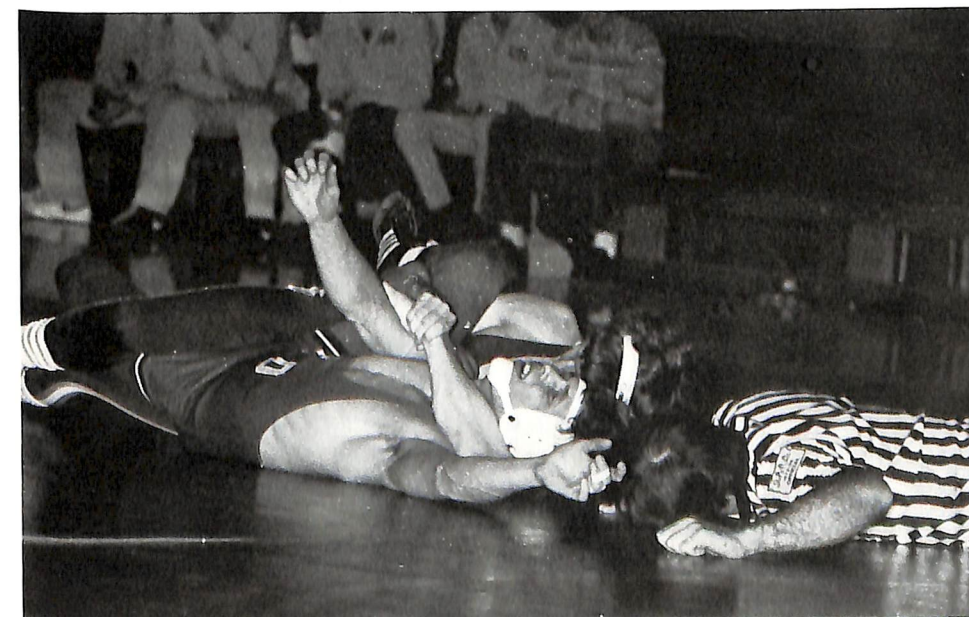

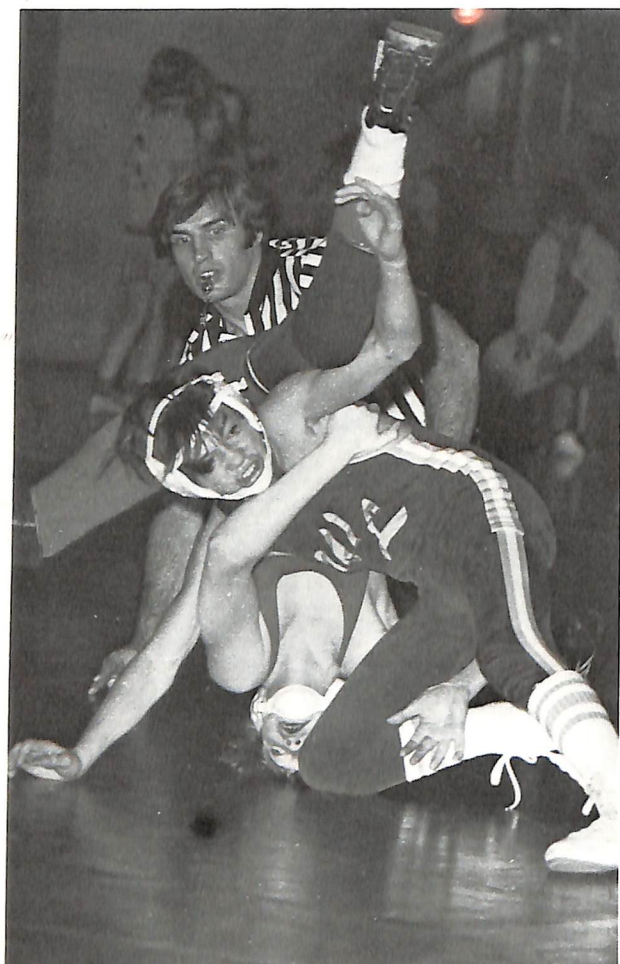

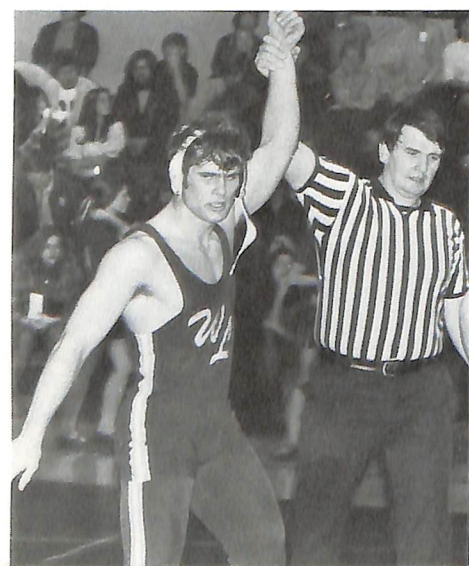

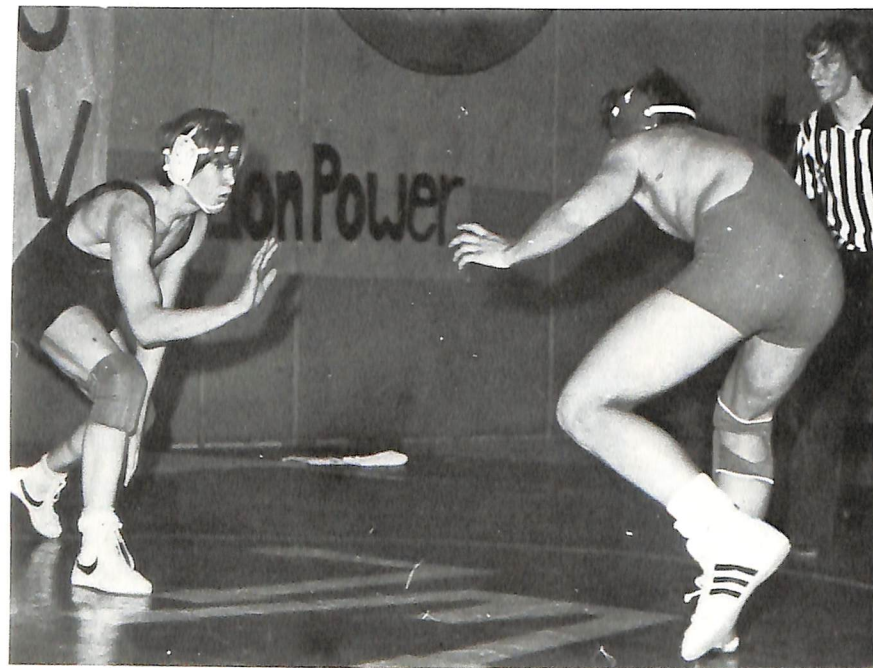

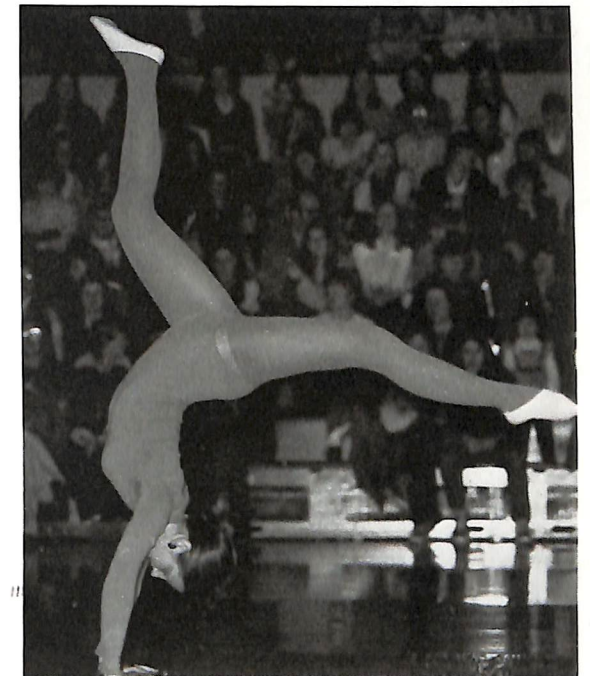

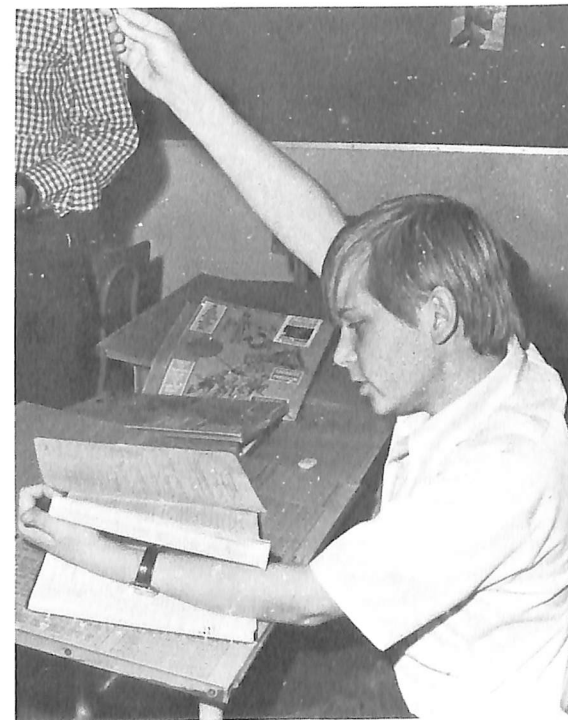

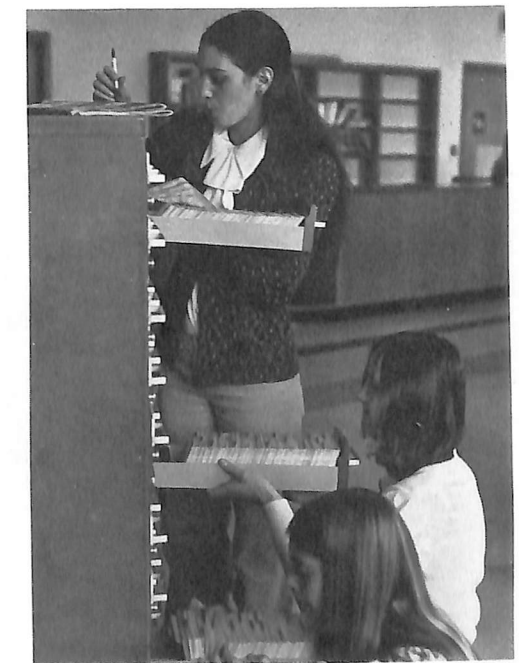

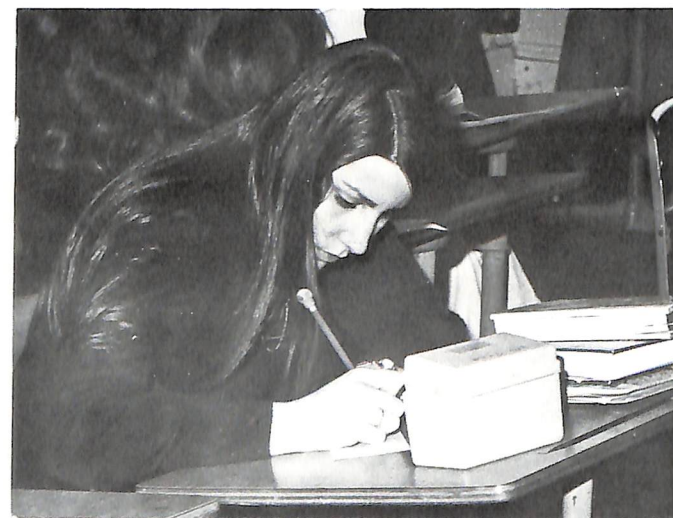

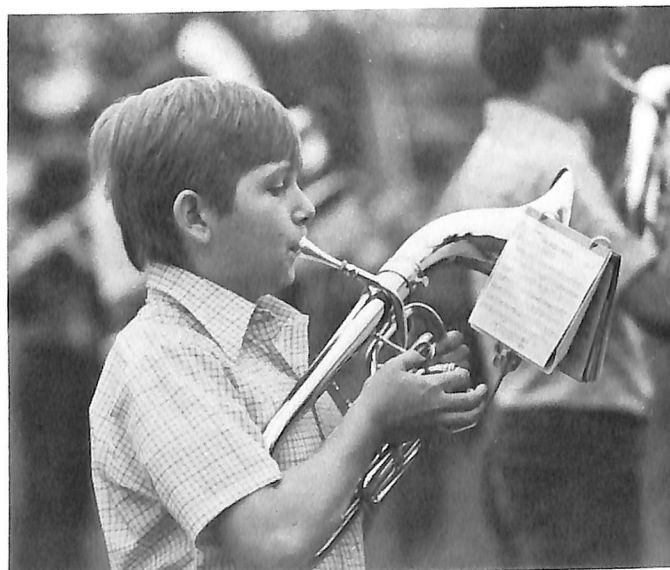

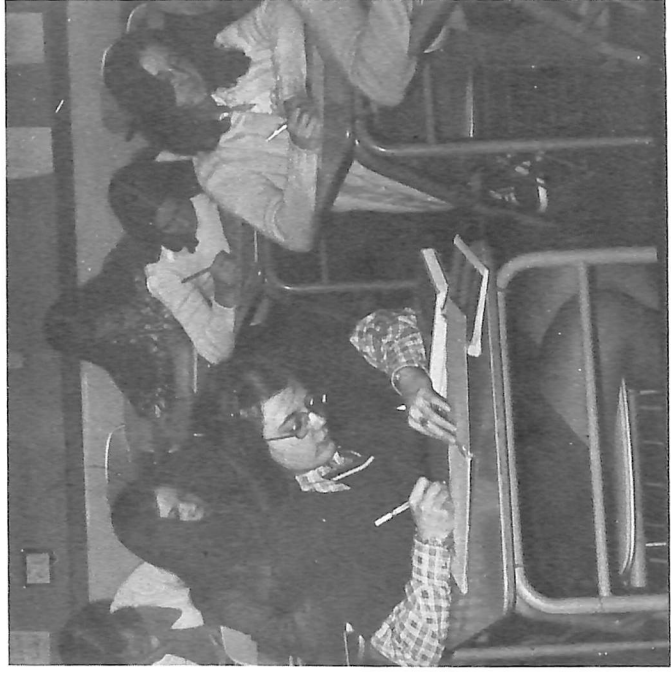

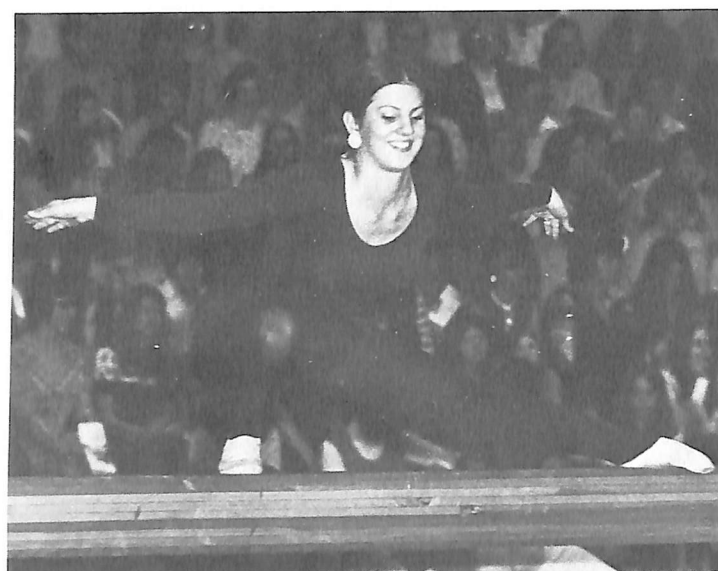

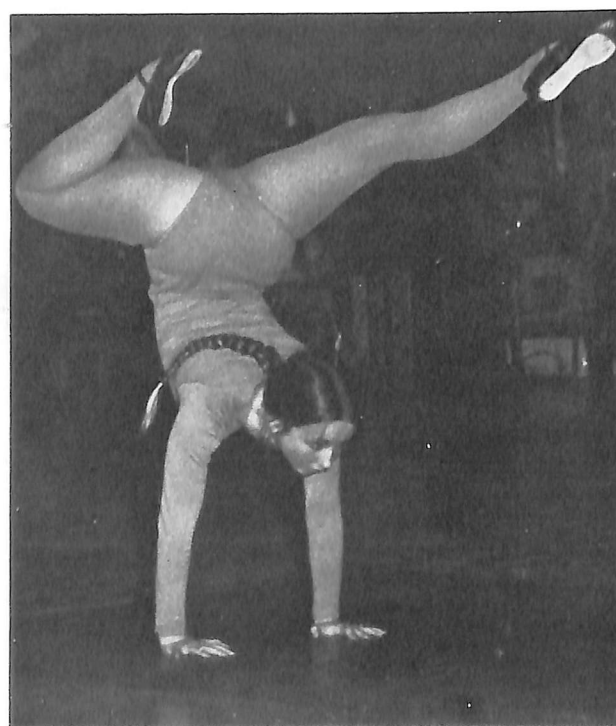

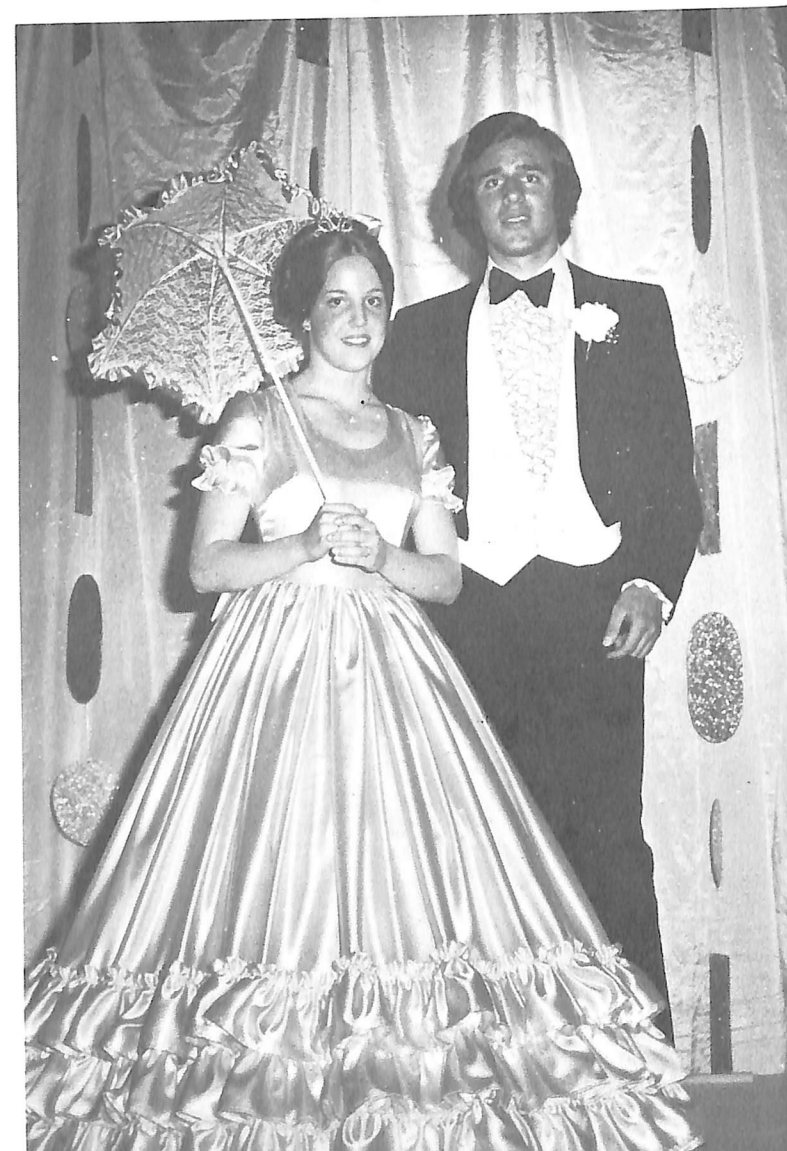

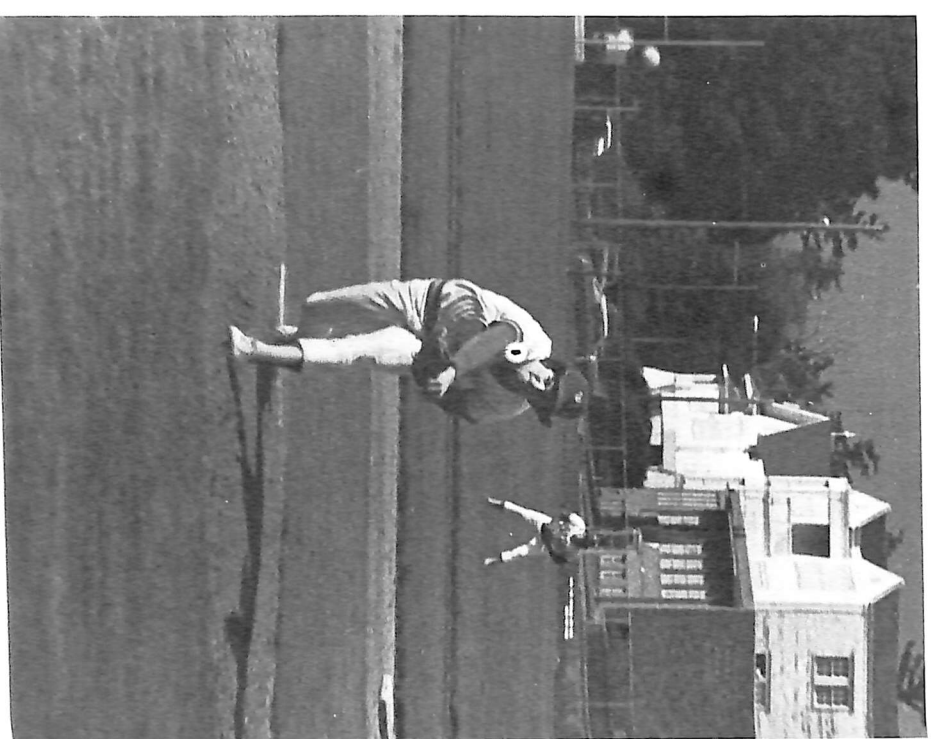

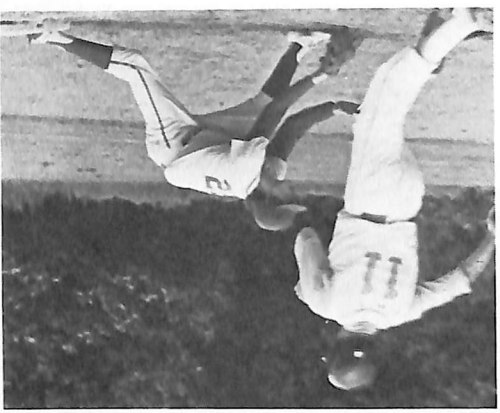

They showed a lot of heart and desire though, as two new records were established through the poor weather. The team shot a new school low, 189, against Oregon City.

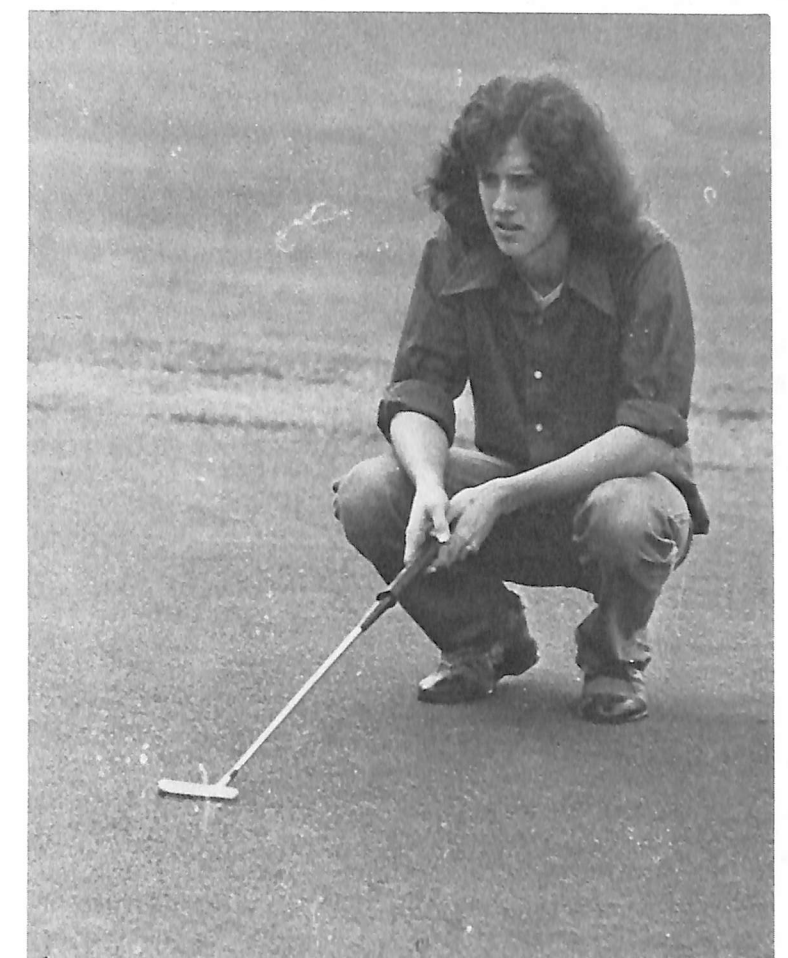

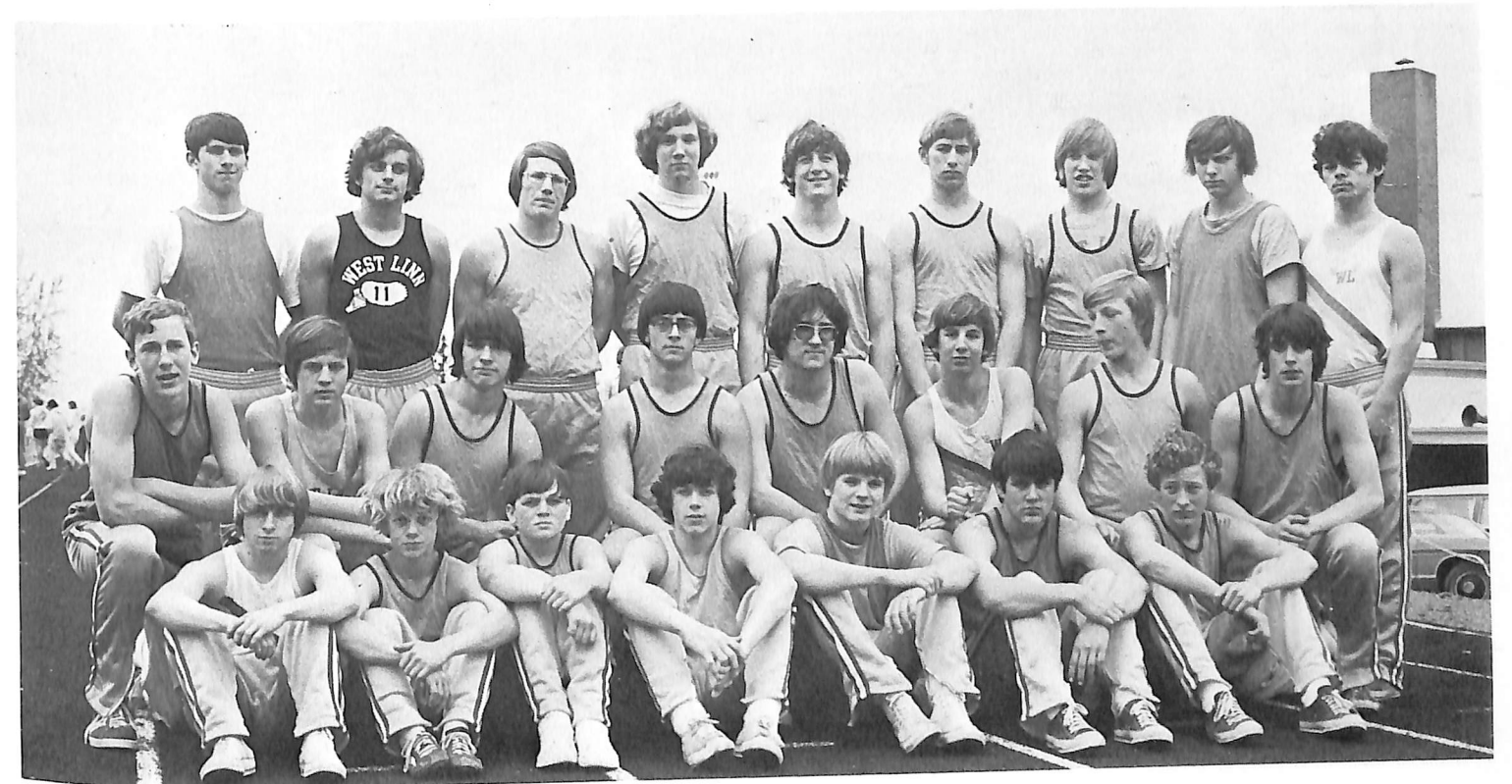

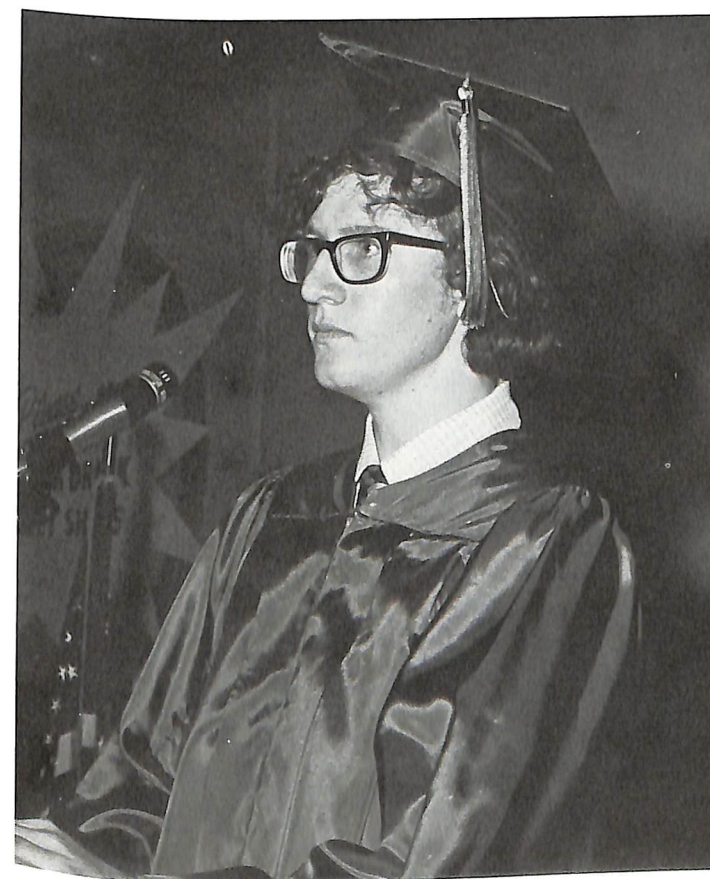

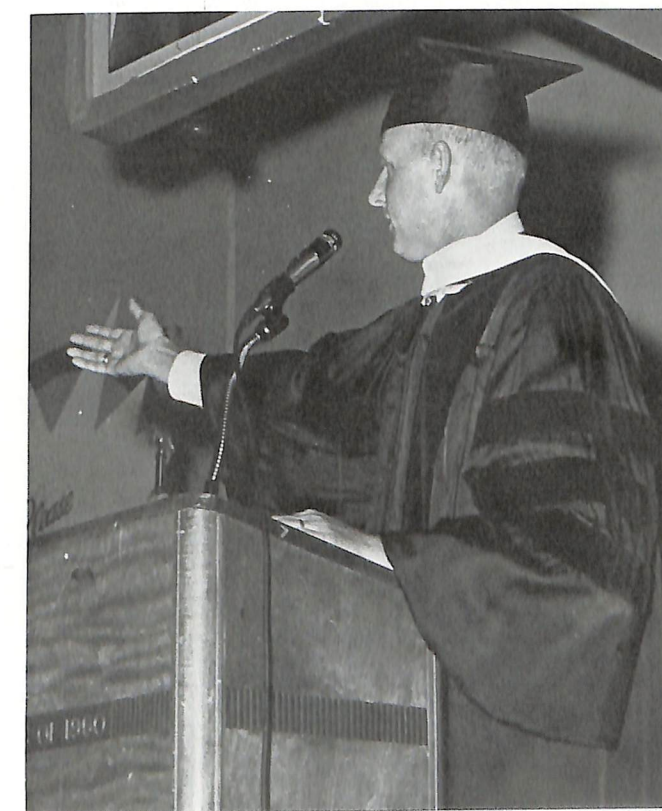

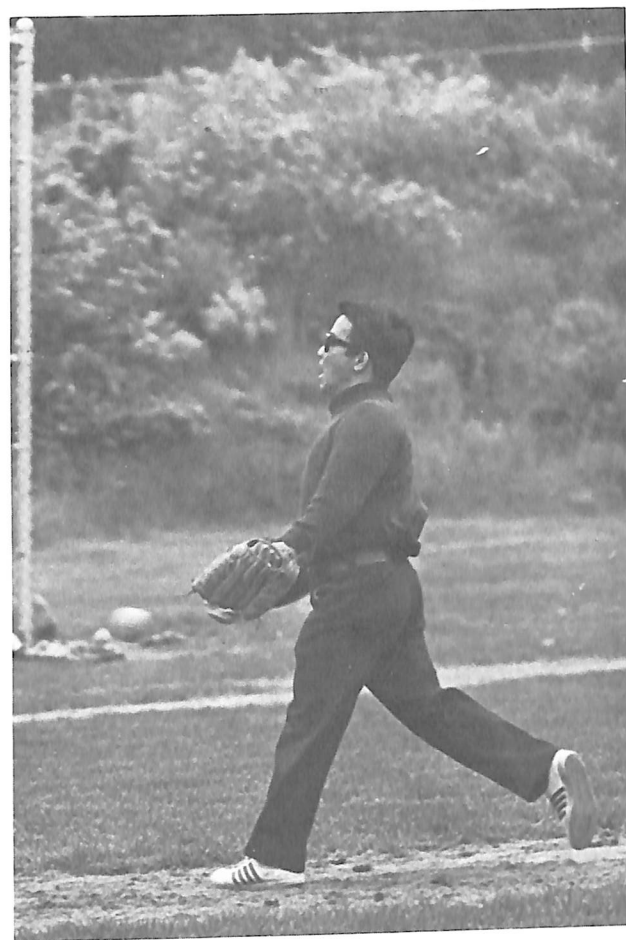

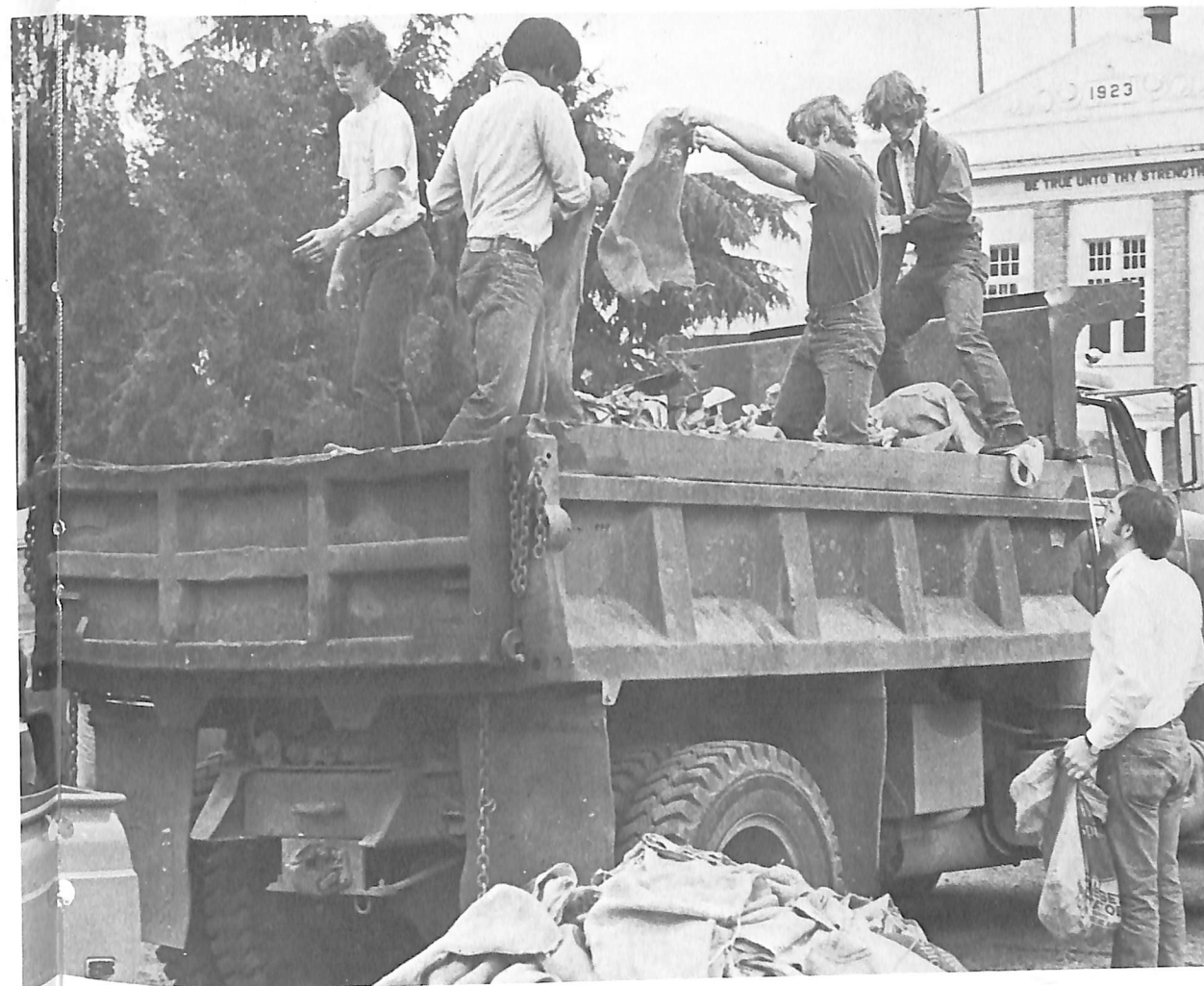

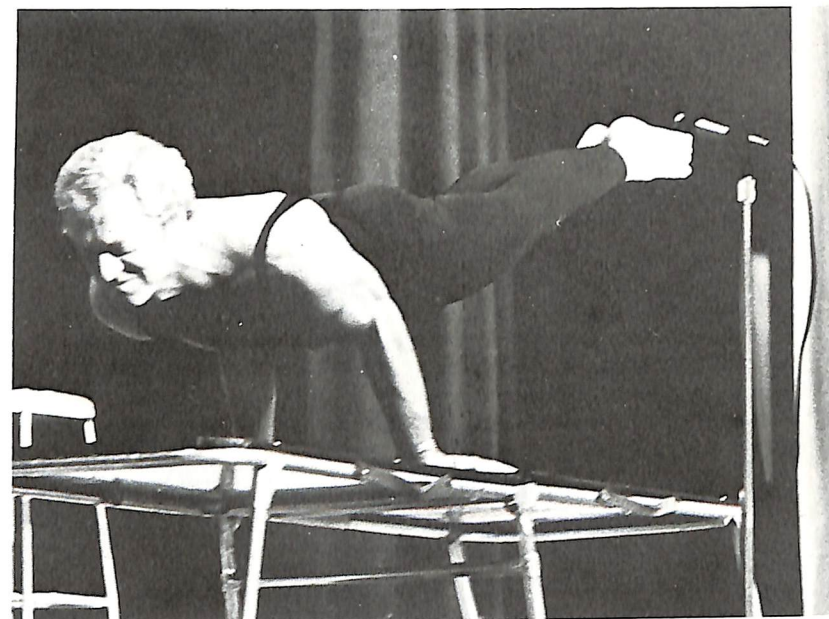

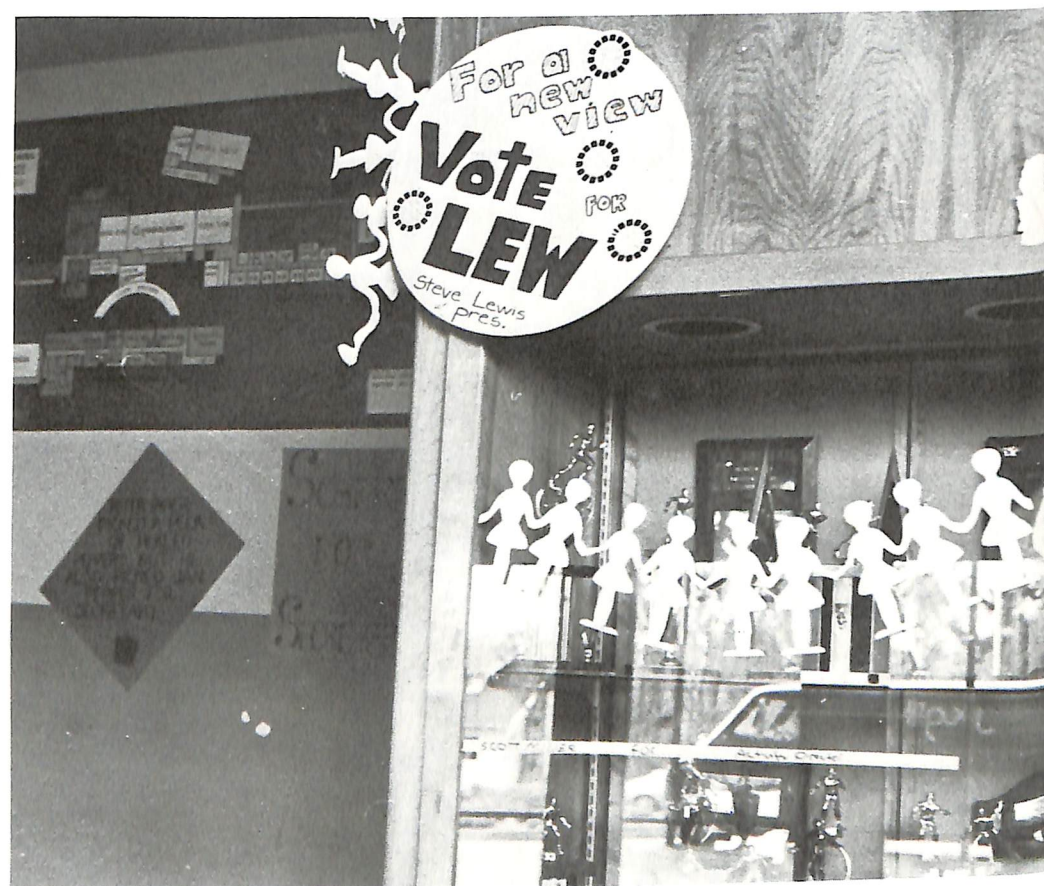

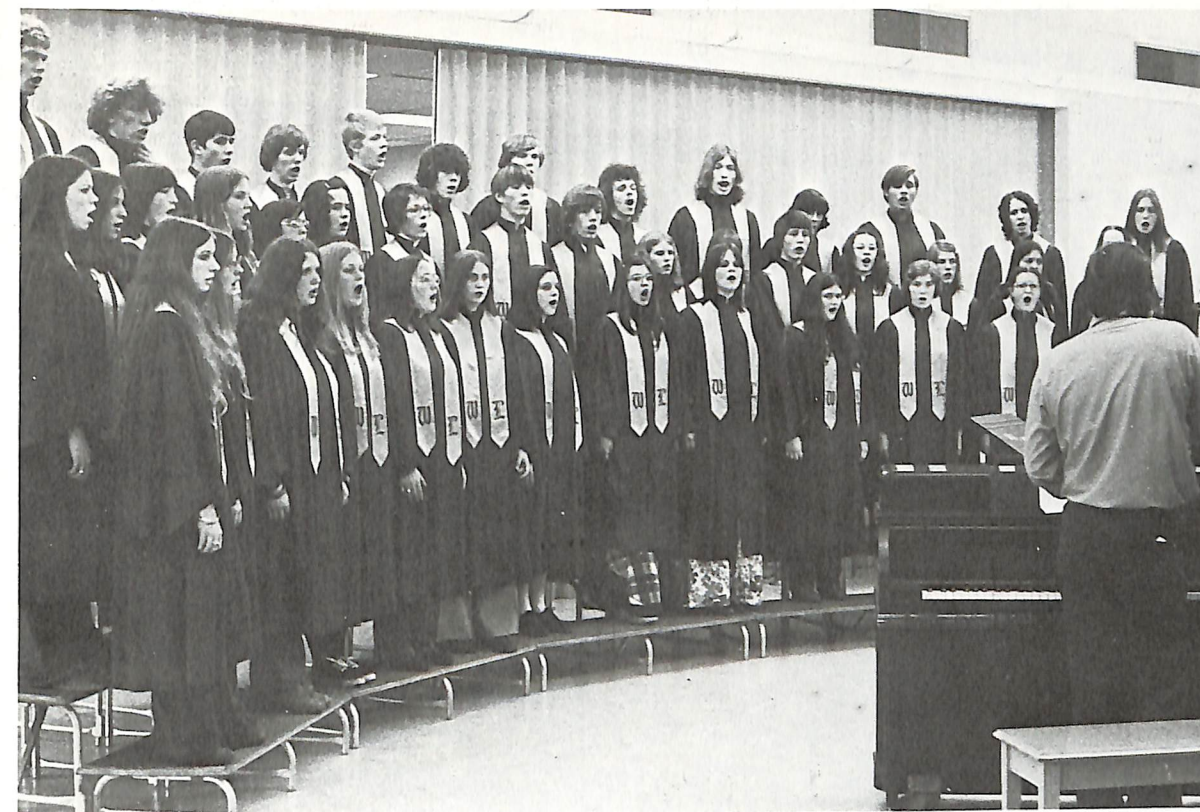

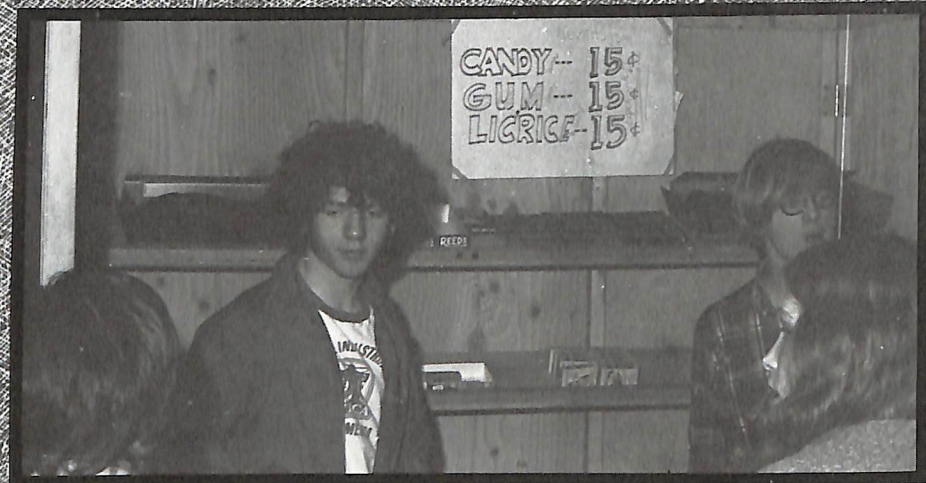

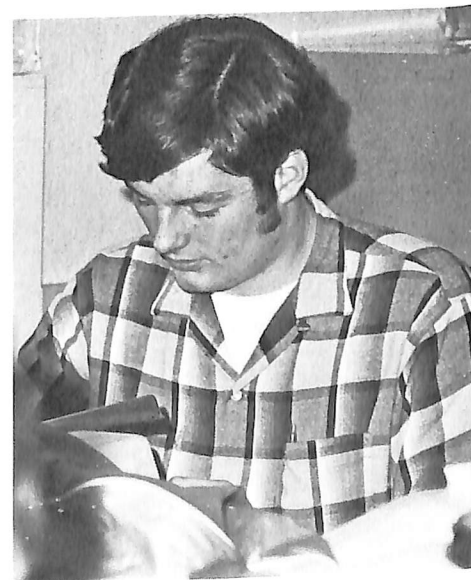

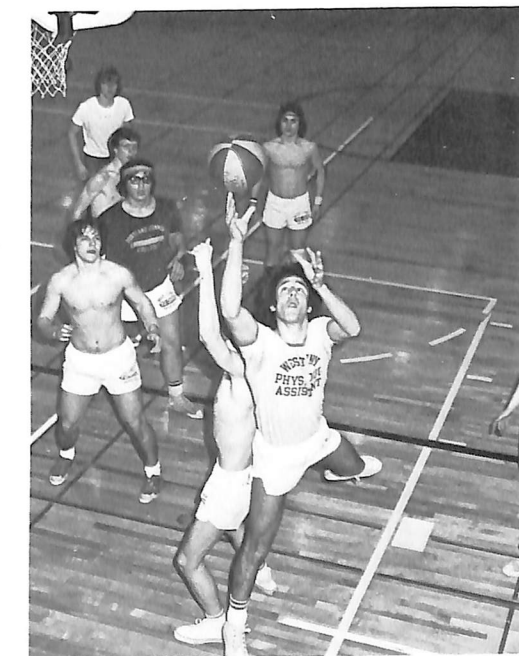

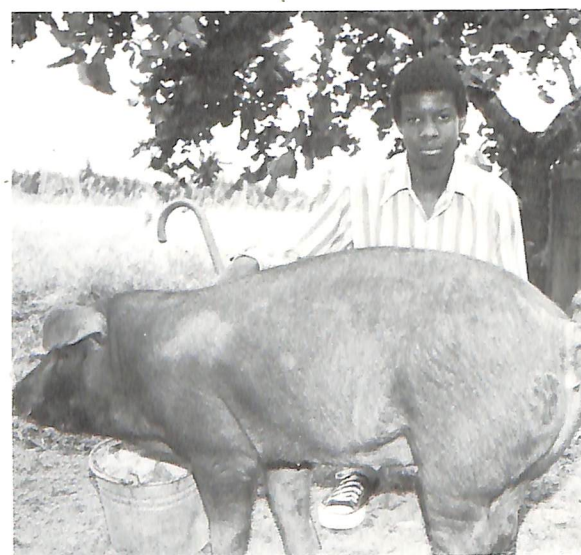

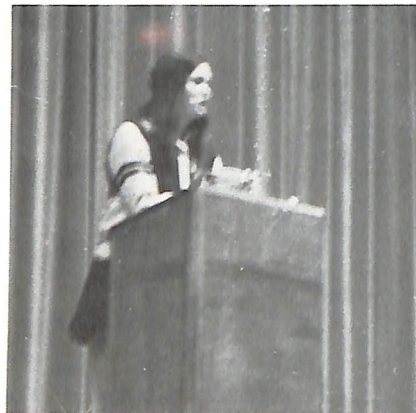

A. The gas allotment for West Lind school buses has been cut 15% effective immediately. This amounts to 900 to 1,000 gallons per month or approximately 45 to 50 gallons a day. The following transportation will be cut or eliminated effective today to save gas:

1. All field trips are eliminated.
2. All rosters' buses are eliminated.
3. Stafford School will discontinue all grades at the same time, saving approximately 92 miles per day.

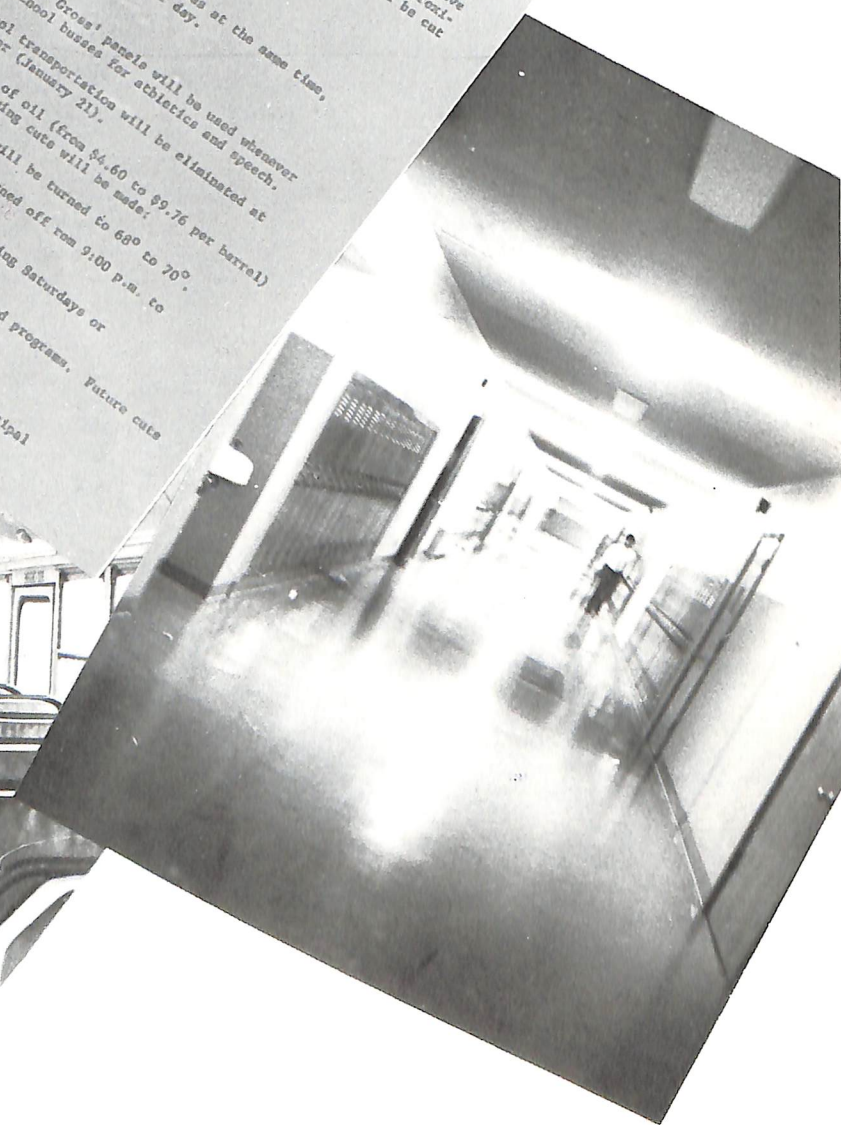
In addition to the above:

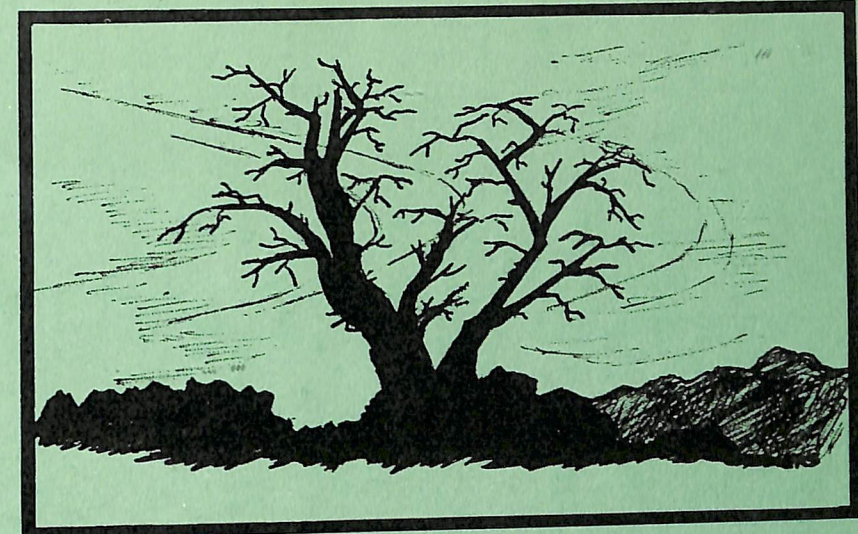
1. The school panel and Mr. Gross' panels will be used whenever possible instead of school buses for athletics and speech.
2. All early period school transportation will be eliminated at the end of this semester (January 21).
3. Due to a 112% increase in the cost of oil (from \$4.60 to \$9.76 per barrel) in the past three months the following cuts will be made:

1. Thermostats in all buildings will be turned off from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
2. Heat in all buildings will be turned off on Saturdays or Sundays.
3. No heat will be on at our schools during Saturdays or Sundays.

C. At this time we will continue all other services and programs. Future cuts may be made depending on the full crisis.
